Sergeant Martini Writes.

In a letter under date of October 14th, 1918, Sgt. Charles J. Martini, of the 336th Aero Squad, Cramlington, Northumberland, England, writes: "The church bells were sounded here last evening for the first time since the war started. A report came that that Germany had accepted Wilson's peace terms; but later the news proved false. It was a great disappointment to have the report denied, as England as bilarious over the supposed good news.

"The ships go up daily and although we have had a strong wind for the past two weeks, they manage to hold their own in the clouds.

"I have become quite accustomed to the English people and their ways. They are very smart as a whip. They are more about this war than I imagine and have memories of a beat. BRADSHAW BUILDING ROADS ON FRENCH TERRITORY.

Vic F. Bradshaw, writing to friends in town from somewhere in France, says in part:

"I am feeling fine, weigh 180 pounds, so you may know Uncle Sam is feeding us follows good, I am sure well pleased and fully satisfied with army life. Enjoyment of soldier life depends on the spirit of the man; if he goes in to see how little he can do, he will not make much of a soldier from the standpoint of ability. I am building, or rather putting in shape, a railroad leading from the French main line to our camp. I have had a detail of from twenty-five to fifty men, and believe me it keeps a fellow going to watch a bunch like that and get the work done. I have handled that many laborers on the Union Pacific, so it comes a little easier for me. We have a big camp here and it is increasing every day. The tanks are there and over when it comes to routing the boches and their machine gun nests. They are very simple in operation but they do the business in paving the way for the infantry and artillery. We are busy getting tuned up for a call on the Kaiser. We are going to go over the "rine" (Rhine) to bring home the bacon. The latter sentence is the slogan of the tank men and it now looks as though it will prove true. "Why walk to Berlin when you can ride in a tank?" Is the question the tank men ask. The headlines of this evening's paper states that Germany has accepted the allies' terms, but when it comes to dealing with that dirty German bunch, I am a pessimist, I don't believe the Kaiser is sincere, but if he parleys a few more months Pershing and Foch will see that his army is removed from Belgium and Alsace-Lorraine and we will then have accomplished a decided victory for our flag and the flags of allies. As for myself I would like to see every boche that pulled a trigger against our boys wiped from the face of the earth together with all the Hohenzollern outfit."
