OCCUPATION ARMY WILL

CONSIST OF 1,400,000 MEN.

Thirty divisions (1,400,000 men) is the size of the American force which will remain in France for the time being as an army of occupation. This was made known Saturday, at least that General Pershing had cabled expressing the wish that an army of such size be maintained in the field for some time. That would leave about seven hundred thousand men to return to their homes, their tasks completed.

General March announced that authority had been given to General Pershing to send back home all such troops as will not be needed in making up the army of occupation. He said that the General Pershing had indicated that the following units would not be so required:

Divisions 31, 34, 38, 39, 76, 84, 86, and 87.

Artillery regiments 46, 47, 49, 50, 75 and 76.

Field artillery brigades 65 and 103.

The composition of divisions designated to return, so far as known is as follows:

Thirty-first (Georgia, Alabama, and Florida), 34th (National Guard troops from Nebraska, Iowa, South Dakota, and Minnesota), 38th (Indiana, Kentucky and West Virginia), 76th (New England), 78th (West New York, New Jersey and Delaware.)

Killing Men to Save Food.

The bolsheviks in Russia are executing prisoners and are making no attempt to conceal that such action has been forced upon them in order to conserve food. The British narrator says that the bolshevik strength in Petrograd, as well as in Moscow, has increased since the attempts on Lenin's life and the advance in the Volga region, largely because many Russian liberals believe that they must choose between the bolshevik and the extreme reactionaries, as none of the moderate leaders in the center show strength. Maxim Gorky has joined the bolshevik and has accepted a position in the department of education. Many others who were at first opposed to the bolshevik are taking similar action.

No Curtailment of Buying.

A Washington dispatch says: Requests that Christmas buying be curtailed this year, made by the council of national defense, in agreement with representatives of leading industries and retail interests have been withdrawn. Christmas buying on the pre-war scale, Governor B. Clarkson, secretary of the council said is "essential to the rapid establishment of normal after the war conditions."

SECRETARY McADOO WILL

STEP DOWN AND OUT.

William G. McAdoo has resigned office as secretary of the treasury and director general of railroads, to leave the treasury on the appointment of a successor and the railroad administration on January 1 next. It was announced that he had asked President Wilson to relieve him now that the war is over so that he might return to private business after six years in office.

President Wilson has acceded to Mr. McAdoo's request, and accepted his resignation.

Retirement was made necessary, Mr. McAdoo said, because of "inadequate compensation," allowed cabinet officers.

There is hoped in many circles that McAdoo in resigning at this time, is really preparing himself to make the presidential race in 1920. By resigning now he will evade the muddles which cannot be avoided. It is urged, in readjusting the railroad situation or the actions on large appropriations which will take up the time of congress in the fore part of next year. He can now retire and make his re-entry into public life in 1920 and point with pride to a great war record.

McAdoo insists flatly that there are not truths in such rumors, that they were not even thought of by him and would receive no consideration. He stands flatly that the original reasons cited by him for resigning will hold good that he must retire to private life to build up his income and guard his health.

51,000 Nebraskans in Service.

First and last Nebraska sent upwards of 51,000 men to the colors during the war just closed. This number does not include the number of dashing boys who enlisted with the Canadian contingent or who really belong to Nebraska but were credited to other states. The records will bear out the statement that in proportion to population Nebraska sent more soldiers and sailors than any other state, just as Nebraska has bought more bonds per capita, more thrift stamps per capita, and contributed more per capita to war activities than any other state.

VICTOR OVER CHINESE DRAGON

American-Made Motortrucks Are Winning Way to Popularity in Land of Conservatism.

Way back before the year 1 they used to build high stone walls around the cities in China to keep out the elements of civilization. Today they are tearing down these walls, breaking them up into fine pieces, and using them to build highways that will enable their new progressive government to make the best use of the American-made motortrucks which China is beginning to utilize.

This is, perhaps, as striking a comment on the economic and political changes that are taking place within this interesting country as has come out of China in a long time. The credit for such progressive policies is given, in the main, to Dr. George E. Morris, famous explorer and political adviser to the Chinese republic, an ex-minister states. Doctor Morris has succeeded in substituting a lot of new American ideas for the superstitions and conservatism of the one-time "heavenly China." And now it is the motortrucks that has gained his championship.

A considerable number of trucks are now in use in China, and they are doing everything required of them with remarkable efficiency, in spite of the difficulty of securing skilled drivers and competent mechanics in that part of the world.

GRATEFUL FOR COLD WATER

Thirsty Fighters Went on Their Way Blessing the Thoughtfulness of That Red Cross Worker.

There was plenty of water in X, but a tin mug of it was more deadly than a German machine gun. It's impossible to push two or three hundred thousand soldiers back and forth over a locality, especially when half of them are Germans and there isn't time to clean up after they have been defeated, and keep the water supply unaffected. And when, as is the case often, the water wasn't very pure to begin with, it's not at all wise to dally with the idea of drinking it. But what can you do when you've been out all day fighting and pursuing Germans and your canteen's empty and the roof of your mouth feels like a vulcanized scrubbing brush?

That's the thought that came to a Red Cross field service man during the hottest fighting in August. It was hot in two senses. The bullets flew and the sun melted. And the Red Cross man took out his largest canteen and filled it with water that was cool and purified. He kept it full all day and every soldier that passed that way had a drink of water. It was water they wanted just then. A little initiative on the part of one man made the soldiers as he himself put it "aburdly grateful." But after struggling across fields and woods all day in the hot sun, well—well men do become aburdly grateful for a drink of cool water.—From a Red Cross Scrapbook.

Since the organization of the Red Cross in Hershey the sum of \$3,394.66 has been received, and \$1,484.40 been paid out, leaving a balance of \$1,909.56. The society voted to contribute \$250 to the Nebraska Base Hospital in France, and to send \$500 to Red Cross headquarters for immediate use.

The Hershey chapter now has enrolled 436 members.—Times.
