WORK GOING FORWARD AT SUTHERLAND POTASH PLANT

Mr. Wallace E. Porter, Managing Trustee of the Republic Chemical Works, was in town Sunday and left almost immediately for Denver with Chief Engineer McCalman to execute contracts which have been pending for several weeks on the furnishing of boilers and other equipment for the plant.

The company now plans to spend considerable more than \$500,000 as its initial investment in its plant west of Sutherland and to help Mr. Porter carry the responsibility the Stockholders have elected a Board of Trustees, the personnel of which makes the future of this concern an assured success.

Mr. M. B. Cottrell of Chicago, a director of the Drexel State Bank of that city and president of the State Savings Bank of Logan, Iowa, is Treasurer; Mr. W. H. Thompson of Grand Island is Counsel; W. H. Guild, Assistant General Manager of the Union Pacific Railway, and Ed. E. Wise, vice-president of Wilke-Mitchell Co., Omaha, and president of the Retail Grocers Assn. of Nebraska are Trustees.

Last week Engineer McCalman made a trip to the lakes out north and left Engineer George M. Ranney up there with a surveying party to locate the various small pumping plants on the lakes and the small pipe lines from same to the main line.

Three routes have been surveyed as the location of this main pipe line which will carry without any pumping 1,000,000 gallons per day of potash brine from the lakes to the plant. Choice of these three routes will probably be made soon so work can be started constructing the road which must be built preparatory to distributing the pipe this winter.

Carloads of pipe, cement and lumber have been on the way for more than two weeks and the foundation trenches are dug for the walls of the Potash warehouse ready for concrete as soon as these materials arrive. A temporary office building and a bunk house and eating house for the men have been built and Mrs. O'Connor and two daughters installed in the latter ready to satisfy any man on the eating end of the scene.

Engineer McCalman says he fully expects to keep at work right through the winter regardless of the weather conditions in order to get the plant in operation early in the spring providing of course he can get the men to help him.—Sutherland Courier.

In a letter dated November 9th to his father, Sergt. Chas. Martini, of this city, in the aviation service in France, says in part: Two new conveyances have been introduced to me since I last wrote.

First—Ford Ambulance and second—Misery Wagon. One, as you know is used to pick up dead people; but I haven't proved to be quite as dead as I looked just a week ago this a. m.

I am waiting for No. 2 now; that is the Misery Wagon. It is the little white car the head nurse pushes around the Hospital wards and dress-rooms.

I had been going up in the air quite frequently until October 31st. I made my last trip at nine o'clock in the morning. We were some three thousand feet up when something went wrong.

What broke I do not know; but when I woke up I was in the Royal Victoria Infirmary at Newcastle. I can't recall a thing about the crash; but perhaps by the time I am able to tell the story completely, we will be closer to home.

I am feeling pretty good at the present time and hope to be back with my Squadron by Xmas. Dad, I am a lucky person and I can't understand why I am not dead. You know a fellow hits pretty hard when he falls three thousand feet.
