### Practical Work in Cooking.

The Household Arts Department of the City Schools must be practical, or it will not be a success. This is especially true of the cooking. Miss Layton, the teacher in charge of this department has 12 Junior High School girls enrolled in the cooking classes and the girls actually make and cook one article of food at each lesson. The equipment is the best and is quite complete. In addition to these classes, Miss Layton has a class of 16 Senior High School girls which meets every day from 10:30 to 12. This class prepares a practical lunch for the teachers consisting of one hot dish, sandwiches, a drink and a dessert. At noon two members of the class serve this lunch to the teachers and after eating their own lunches they clear away the dishes and put everything in place for the afternoon classes. The teachers pay the actual cost of the lunch and are greatly pleased with the arrangement. The girls get the practical phase of serving and cooking in quantities. Miss Layton also has the older girls do part of the marketing and this has proven to be a help to the teacher and a benefit to the girls.

### 2,807 FLU DEATHS IN NEBRASKA SINCE OCTOBER.

At the state conference held in Lincoln Tuesday, on the epidemic of Spanish influenza prevailing in Nebraska, it was learned that there were approximately five thousand cases listed in the state. A total of 2,807 deaths as the result of the "flu" have been reported since October, when the disease first made its appearance.

Consideration of a uniform system of combating the disease in the state was the object of the meeting and while a state wide ban was discussed, it was not put into effect.

Dancing, promiscuous nursing, visiting, crowding, sneezing, coughing, the use of roller towels, and the common drinking cup were cited by Dr. Wild of the health office, as agencies in spreading the "flu." Some people have fantastic ideas as to means of combating the disease. Sprinkling the streets with formaldehyde was impractical, he said, while eating fried onions or wearing medicated bags were simply foolish.

"If you get the 'flu' go home right away and don't stay in your place of business to expose others," he counselled. "And when you go home, go to bed and stay there until the doctor says you are ready to get up. You may feel as though you could throw an ox, but when you get up, you will find you can hardly stand. Don't try to return to regular work for three weeks."

The state health department, Dr. Wild said, could not undertake to enforce quarantine regulation but must depend upon local officials for that. Proper organization in each community would take care of that problem, he said.

### A Reply to Rev. Koch.
