Many Seeking Employment.

Washington—Reports from twenty-one cities showing more than 135,000 unemployed, were submitted to the house immigration committee by Frank Morrison, secretary of the American Federation of Labor, in support of his contention that "there will be bread lines in every industrial center before May 1." Mr. Morrison appeared in support of legislation to restrict immigration.

The reports submitted were in addition to those from thirty cities given to the committee last Thursday by Mr. Morrison and showed Detroit with 50,000 unemployed; Philadelphia with 10,000; Indianapolis, 8,000; Bridgeport, Conn., 15,000; Charleston, W. Va., 3,000; Worcester, Mass., 12,000; San Francisco, 15,000; Tacoma, Wash., 2,500; Denver, 1,750; Great Falls, Mont., 1,000; Akron, Ohio, 2,500; Schenectady, N. Y., 3,500 and Pittsburg, 10,000.

A report from Seattle, Wash., said it was impossible to give the approximate number of unemployed there but that there were thousands, and that the number was increasing daily. The situation was becoming so menacing it was stated that government intervention might soon be necessary.

Mr. Morrison told the committee that further proof is being obtained daily of the increasing extent of unemployment and that action must be taken immediately if serious labor troubles are to be avoided. He said that two things should be done by congress: First, that legislation providing for the employment of returning soldiers be passed and second, that immigration be stopped until normal times are again reached.

In Memoriam.

Elmer Wilcox, third son of Mr. and Mrs. O. D. Shaner, was born Nov. 18, 1887, near Lafayette, Ill., died a soldier's death at Chateau Thierry, France, Aug. 4th 1918. Attended the schools, grew to manhood and worked on the farm in his native state until the spring of 1906 when with his father's family he came to the present farm home, southwest of Maxwell. The fall of 1908 he went back to Illinois remaining there two years when he returned to Nebraska to make his home. During a revival meeting at Maxwell under Rev. Horan's pastorate, he gave his heart to Christ, uniting with the Maxwell Baptist church, remaining a member of that organization until the McPherson Baptist church was organized, when he by his own wish was dismissed from the Maxwell church to become a charter member of the McPherson church, being church clerk at the time of his call to the colors. He was faithful to his church and Sunday school. His was a quiet disposition, loving to read and most of his leisure time was spent with books and periodicals. In business he was honest and square, would rather suffer an injustice than take unfair advantage of another.

When the call for registration came to our young men Elmer was one of those chosen, going to Camp Funston Oct. 4, 1917. Was home on a fourteen day furlough in December 1917; sent to Camp Merritt, N. J., in February 1918, overseas in March of same year. Writing letters to the home folks every month from France, the last one dated July 20th. In the terrible fighting at Chateau Thierry he made the supreme sacrifice and his spirit went to God who gave it. The letter from his lieutenant reading that he died a soldier's death.

While it is so hard for us who knew him best, and who will miss him the most, we feel that he lived his soldier life, just as faithful as he did his home life. His work on earth is done, and some day we hope to meet him where there will be no more wars, no more sorrow, no more tears.

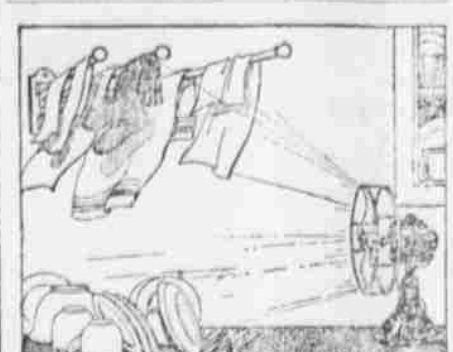

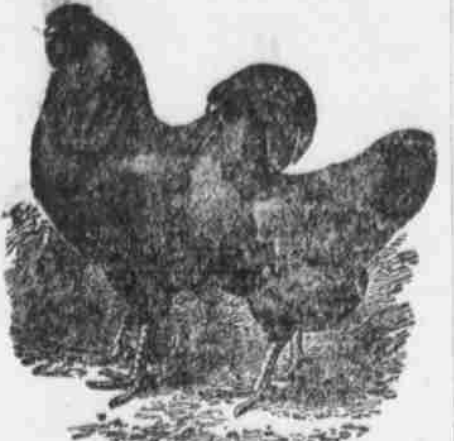
