SERGEANT SIDNEY McFARLAND WRITES FROM GERMANY.

Writing to his parents from Insul, Germany, under date of January 1st, Sergeant Sidney McFarland says in part:

"This is the beginning of a new year and I spent it well with a gat strapped to my side, being on guard duty. We had a good dinner and my New Year's present was a letter from Lieut. A. J. Wessburg and I was sure glad to hear from him. There is much doing and it is hard to tell when we will get home, though report says we will leave the 15th of January—the sooner the better for me. Insul is a short hike from Leimbach, where we had been since December 16th resting. Have had some good experiences, and some tough old grinds. Have had some wonderful hikes, but think we are about through with them. We are drilling now and doing a lot of guard duty. It is a great life and I am not sorry I came—wish I had gotten here sooner. I suppose you are wondering, and especially father, how I and the coolies are getting along. Well, we make it all right—I have several tame ones.

The Germans and Americans get along fine together. They think a great deal of our president and France is having the time of her life since the president arrived there. The most of us stay in German homes and they treat us good. I have a nice feather bed to sleep on every night. I can eat most anything now, though we have plenty to eat. For dinner today we had steak, mashed potatoes, tomatoes, gravy, bread and coffee; for supper we had pork, potatoes, tomatoes, bread and syrup. Most every breakfast we have oatmeal or rice, syrup, coffee and bread.

For Christmas the Y. M. C. A. gave us eight bars of chocolate, six cigars, three boxes of cookies, cigarettes and tobacco. This was much appreciated. Some snow fell, the first we have had, and it made it seem more like Christmas.

Insul, where I am now located, is not many miles from Coblenz, in a valley, and the mountains near by are covered with trees, mostly evergreens. The scenery is great. The Moselle river is also beautiful. We crossed it at Remich, Tries and Berncastelle. We are not yet to the Rhine, but it is not far away.

Every little village has a fine church. The French and Germans are very religious but are far behind the times. They use oxen in place of horses. I am in the best of health.

Notice to Red Cross Workers. We have a large quota of refugee and hospital garments to be finished at once.

All who can, are asked to come sew and help complete this quota. The workroom on the third floor of federal building is open every day except Saturday, at 2 p. m.

The north side workroom, Lincoln school, is open Monday, Wednesday and Friday afternoon.

BRYAN HIGGINS WRITES FROM THE LAND OF THE HUN.

Christmas, 1919.

My dear Mother and Father: I just finished my Christmas dinner and have been sitting here wondering what you were doing and what you would have for a Christmas dinner and wishing that I could be with you. The last time I wrote you we were on the march, I think we have about finished our hiking, at least I hope so.

We are now at a small town, Homorath near Adneau, about forty kilometers from the Rhine and fifty or sixty kilometers from Coblenz. We started from a small town, Aulnois, France, located southwest of Nancy, not so very far from Verdun. We marched between Metz and Verdun. We thought at first that we were going to Metz, but when we had hiked to within twenty-five kilometers of Metz, they changed our direction and we marched right on by Metz and Vreji, Dilsdenhoffen, Prutges, Rhemish, Frudor and Tries. You can probably find some of these towns on a map. You probably know more about what is going on over here than I do. We never hear anything, nor see any newspapers.

The reason I haven't written more often is, we haven't been able to mail letters while on the go. But now I think that I can write more often unless we start to move again. We are stationed very comfortably here, only one company in a town. One very peculiar thing about this country is that there doesn't seem to be anybody living in the country; all the farmers are assembled in little towns, the towns only six or eight kilometers apart—a kilometer is five-eighths of a mile. Most of the country we have traveled over has been mountainous. I don't know whether all the country is like that or not. I find both France and Germany much different from what I had imagined them to be. I had always thought that every little strip of ground that was possible to cultivate was under cultivation, but everywhere I have been from Bordeaux, France, to this far in Germany I have found that there is about as much land going to waste here in proportion to quantity as in the U. S. On our march each day we passed through forest after forest. Most of these have been planted. Where trees have been cut down others are planted in their place. All of the machinery is rude and antiquated, just like that seen pictured in ancient histories.

In the town where we were billeted, I saw an International Harvester company mowing machine. Have also seen two DeLaval cream separators and have seen two National cash registers. A farmer who owns a horse or two and a cow is considered well to do. It doesn't seem possible for any German to leave such conditions, and going to America and becoming rich, could side with Germany in the war. Many of the people have lost all in the war. I cannot tell you of the things seen in a letter near so well as I can when I get home. It is rumored that we will be home soon.

There was a snow last night, the first I have seen for two years. It made it seem like Christmas. I have wished many times that I could be home to spend Christmas with you, but we can be very thankful that the war is over and that we are not still in the trenches and no more of our boys are to be killed and left here for ever away from kindred and friends. I will write again soon.

Triumph of American Dyes.

The latest official reports for the fiscal year which ended with June show that the American exports of aniline dyes for 1918 amounted to \$7,293,080. This, when compared with our imports of aniline dyes in 1914, is significant of the strides made by American chemists in the dye situation. Germany supplied these coal dyes before the war and America paid more than \$7,000,000 a year for the products. Today America makes enough of the leading colors for home needs and is supplying other countries in large quantities, as the exports indicate.

In the early days of 1915 there were but seven companies in America producing color. Today it is estimated that there are about 150 concerns in this line.

According to the best statement they are able to make of the situation the distillers stand a poor chance to have the enforcement of the national amendment delayed a single hour by their appeal to the courts. If the referendum could be applied in the fourteen states in which some form of direct legislation is in effect it would only be necessary for the dries to win in seven to make the amendment stand. Nearly all of the direct legislation states are as dry as Nebraska. The political forces that fought for state prohibition were in almost every case identical with those favoring the referendum. It is a deadly disappointment to the liquor interests, but they have less than one chance in a thousand to delay the vote in some of the states knew that it had really begun.—State Journal.

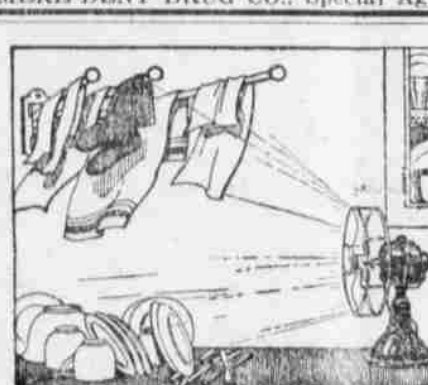
