CLARENCE McCABE TELLS OF FIGHTING IN FRANCE.

Writing to his parents from Andernach, Germany, under date of January 20th, Clarence McCabe says:

"We have been stationed here in Andernach for over two weeks. It is a city of 9,000 and is the first town of any size that I have been stationed in. Last spring just before we went to the front I was on detached duty with the 38th Infantry. After being with them through the war, we have finally returned to the 5th Battalion headquarters. We are billeted in a steam heated piano factory and have the freedom to go and come almost when we please. After practical starvation with the 38th Infantry we are now getting so much that I seldom eat myself and my clothes have been through the 'de-louser' three or four times and I am glad to say I sleep in peace once more. The Y. M. C. A. and the K. of C. provide plenty of entertainment and hot chocolate. There is also a government commissary here at which we can purchase almost any thing we desire.

Just before we left Obermendig the 38th Regiment was decorated with the Croix de Guerre and palm leaf. This is the highest award of the French government. It was given for the gallant fighting done by the 38th in stopping the German drive on Paris July 15th.

Was sorry to hear of Lee Bird's death and Noel Donegan dying of wounds. You ask me to tell something more about the circumstances under which Noel was wounded. I do not know anything very authentic. I only know that which was told me by one of his comrades and I don't think he knew very much about it. He told me that Noel received his wounds one night when the 7th Engineers were passing through the village of Montfaucon. The village is the one from which the German Crown Prince watched the first German offensive at Verdun. It is located on a height which overlooks the surrounding country. The town had just been captured from the Germans a few days before and was subjected to heavy artillery fire from the German guns.

The 7th Engineers were caught in shell fire when passing through this village, and that is when Noel received his wounds. The next day the Fifth division, to which the 7th Engineers are attached, reached the front. The Third division was holding the front at the time, but the line companies had been reduced to one-fourth their original number and the driving power of the division was gone, have been expended in the gaining of only a few kilometers during some of the hardest fighting of the war. Though the Third division was in this weakened condition, it was not relieved by the Fifth division. They merely went through our front lines and made an attack. This was the Fifth's first taste of real war and their infantry became scattered from the front line back to Brest, the A. E. F. embarkation port. The infantry had fallen in the attack and the 7th Engineers, who had been building and repairing roads all night were called upon to go over the top. They did so and gained their objective. The Fifth was then in such a scattered condition, it had to be withdrawn and the Third remained in line a couple of weeks longer until the Fifth came in again and relieved us.

At this writing it looks as though the Third Division will sail for home before the middle of the summer. It doesn't make any difference, however, for we are seeing lots of Europe and when the division gets official orders to move toward home, we get a furlough to visit some of the different European countries we have not already seen. This is a liberal education in itself. Tell Father McCab that it is now too late to get war relics. I could have gotten lots of them at the front and sent them home.

Clarence encloses in his letter an order issued by Major General Dickman in which he expresses his appreciation of the part taken by the Fifth Battalion, Signal Corps, of the Third division (of which Clarence is a member) for their magnificent work between July 14th and 31st, in which the enemy's offensive was checked and the Germans afterwards attacked, routed and pursued. "The work of the 5th Field Signal Battalion," says the commanding general, "is deserving of the highest praise, and whatever success may have been accomplished by this division is due to no small measure to the efficiency of this unit."
