The forms have been distributed and were released today without awaiting signature of the revenue bill by the president. The form for individual incomes of more District 56, approved. than 35,000 and other tax return Bond of E. K. The individual form for incomes of \$5,000 or less is a printed sheet di- Dist. 45, approved. vided into three parts, one constituting a "work sheet" on which a taxpayer may figure his income according to the guide provided, another containing detailed instructions and the third being the actual raturn form. Married persons or heads of families who made \$2,000 or more, and single persons, who made \$1,000 or more in 1918, must make out returns before March 15th

Accompaning the individual return form is a schedule for use of farmers in calculating net income for 1918. This will assist a farmer in determining value of crops, live stock, corn products, live stock products, and other materials, sold and on hand. and expenses.

Paris, Feb. 19.-Georges Clemenceau, the French premier, was struck three times by bullets in an attempt to assassinate him today. One bullet entered the right shoulder and lodged under the left shoulder, missing the spinal cord and the lungs. The other two bullets caused scarcely more than abrasions of the skih on the right arm and right hand. Two bullets passed through the clothing of the premier.




