Loss to the world through interruption of normal commerce and industry \$200,000,000,000.

Twenty-five countries involved—twenty-one allies and four Huns.

Many Sattles to Build Roads

Washington.—Approximately half a billion dollars will be spent on highway construction during the coming season, giving employment to 100,000 men, according to an estimate by the department of agriculture based on known federal funds available and a survey of the state and municipal funds made at a conference between Secretary Houston and representatives of the highway departments of twenty-seven states.

Secretary Houston told the state representatives that the department desired to give every aid in expediting assumption of highway building under the federal aid road act, and announced that the president has signed the postoffice bill carrying a \$200,000,000 road fund, much of which will be available after July 1.

Campaign Against League

Washington.—A country-wide campaign in opposition to the league of nations will be started immediately after the president's departure for Europe. Senator Borah and Senator Reed will speak in New York on Thursday night against the proposed league. Senator Borah will speak in Boston on the following night. After that he will make speeches in Chicago and other principal cities of the country, extending his trip to San Francisco. Senator Borah will speak only by invitation. He has already accepted invitations that will keep him constantly engaged for the last month following the adjournment of congress. He will not make any plans beyond that period, because of the possibility that the president will recognize the necessity of calling an extra session of congress.

Other senators are also accepting invitations to address mass meetings on the subject.
