LIEUT. COBBY'S EXPERIENCE AND RECORD IN THE WAR.

Lieut. Luther Cobby, who had been visiting his sister, Mrs. Zook, at the state farm, left for Denver this week, Supt. W. P. Snyder furnishes the following relative to Lieut. Cobby's record and experience in the war:

The modesty of the returned soldier is surpassed only by the modesty of his family. For ten days past a hero of the war has been with us and few knew of his presence or his part in the war.

Entering the firing zone with the first American troops, continuing in the fighting for more than a year until wounded shortly before the signing of the armistice; single handed taking the first German prisoner captured by American troops; being awarded the Croix de Guerre for holding the Germans back of the Marne at Chateau Thierry; for five days and nights without rest or sleep with his machine guns, when during one day the Germans made nine attempts to force a crossing of the bridge he held; being forty-six days without undressing in the St. Mihiel and Argonne fighting; going into No Man's Land alone with a shot gun to get a machine gun that his men were unable to locate and in doing so shot by a bullet from the gun he was after; lying wounded in a shell hole directing the fire of his men while the German bullets were peppering about him and a little later being complimented by the captured German officer of the gun he was after and given an Iron Cross by this officer; hiding in shell hole while the Germans passed by him forcing the American troops driving them; lying all night in a water logged shell hole with his wound festering; being shifted here and there for five days before reaching a hospital where the Argonne mud could be washed off and adequate care given; recommended for the American badge of honor, which will undoubtedly be awarded him.

These phases sketch just a few of the heroic deeds accomplished, the suffering endured by Lieut. Luther Cobby. As truly as ever the prophets entertained angels unawares, we now entertain heroes.

Peace Pact Ready Next Week

With the military terms already adopted by the Supreme War Council and the naval terms quite well formulated, it is likely that the preliminary peace will be ready for the acceptance of the German government by March 20. The military terms are such that Germany will be reduced to a status lower than that of her small military neighbor. The most powerful military nation of the world at the beginning of the war, she will be

impotent even against the army of little Switzerland at its close.

One of the most important provisions of the military treaty is the twelve-year enlistment plan which abolishes the old conscription act of the German government. This will allow a purely professional army of one hundred thousand men, doing away forever with the danger of an army of several million trained men.

The infamous gen-eral staff will also be wiped out.
