CAPT. HALLIGAN IN REGIMENT WITH BOYS OF COMPANY E

The following letter was received by J. J. Halligan from his son Capt. P. R. Halligan now in Germany: "Insne, Germany, Feb. 24, 1919. My Dear Father: I have been traveling around so much since I left Esch, that I have neglected writing to you. I am very nicely located, and if I have to stay in Europe for some time I would just as soon stay here as to keep moving around the way I have been.

It is strange that after being over here several months, I should be transferred to a regiment that had all of my old Company. All of Company E are in this regiment. I have a number in this company (A) which I command at the present time. I was surely glad to see the boys as they seemed glad to see me. Saturday night a big delegation of them came down from Co. D and last night a delegation from C and B companies. Mose McFarland has been here all afternoon and evening. I certainly enjoy their visit. I think every officer in the regiment knows me, because every time I meet an officer, the first thing he says is that he has some of my old men in his company. I have a nice bunch of officers in my company and the men are all clean fellows.

We are located on the Ahr river, which flows into the Rhine. It is about 40 kilometers to the Rhine and about 80 kilometers to Coblenz. I am sure I will get to see Coblenz before I come back. I don't think I will be here very long, as I am simply an attached and also a surplus officer. They are filling the positions with officers who desire to remain in service. I think I will probably be transferred to a division and return home with some national guards or a national army division. We have officers school every night. They are working the men and officers pretty hard. I cannot get up much interest in it now, that the war is over.

I have been on the range all day. It is very disagreeable work, because of the fact that it has rained so much lately. I understand that their winter is all over now. It has turned warmer and the ground is about all thawed out. Also the spring rains have started again.

The German people are very friendly in this vicinity. Of course we are not allowed to fraternize with any in any way, but it is impossible to prevent the men from doing so when they are billeted right in their houses. The population, however, is very anxious to be friendly and will do anything for us, but we are not permitted to accept anything from them.

I am very anxious to get home, because I feel that I am losing valuable time here. It will mean that I have spent nearly three years in the army because I think I will hardly be mustered out of the service much before June. I am anxious to get some mail, as the last letter I received was January 5th. When you move around over here it raises the dickens with your mail.

Lots of love to you and mother. As ever your son, ROLFE"

Surrenders Fleet

The German merchant marine is to be surrendered to the allies in return for the lifting of the food embargo which will permit the shipment of foodstuffs into Germany, now that the Germans have accepted the allied economic terms. A rental will be paid to the German government for the use of her merchant marine, the amount of the rental being credited on the bill for grain shipped in by the allied governments.

The Sutherland Courier has this to say of a North Platte boy: "Mr. William A. Norris, B. Sc. in Geology, a graduate of Nebraska University, who worked under Dr. G. E. Condra, Director of the Conservation and Soil Survey of Nebraska for one year, has been added to the Republic Chemical Works staff. Mr. Norris has spent a year and a half in the prospecting of potash lakes and the locating of wells. He is directing the blocking of the lakes held under lease by the Republic Chemical Works, preliminary to the laying of their pipes and reports the company's holdings as being very valuable."

Demobilization Slowing Down

That demobilization is slowing down is indicated by the report issued from the office of Chief of Staff March Saturday. 34,931 soldiers and sailors returned to their homes last week, the smallest number since the beginning of the demobilization on November 24. This thought to be due to the fact that only enough men are left at the cantonments in this country to maintain them, and the demobilization now depends on the number sent from overseas.

The total number of men who have returned to civilian life is 1,419,386 to date. All but two hundred and fifty thousand of the total number ordered sent home on November 11, are now in civilian life.
