VICTORY LOAN WORKERS COMMENCE TO GET BUSY

Last week County Chairman Temple met with the Woman's Committee in Frank Buchanan's office and discussed the work of the coming Victory Loan.

The drive will commence April 21st and will be on for three weeks, or until May 10th. However, the local committees expect to clean up Lincoln county in the first ten days.

It is not known just what amount of bonds Lincoln county will be expected to buy, but it will probably be something similar to what had to be raised in the Fourth drive, namely, \$600,000. The bonds, or rather notes, will not run for over five years and will carry a higher rate of interest than any of the former bonds issued.

The committees have decided to open headquarters where both the men's and woman's committee will meet and do the work required, which will involve the mailing out of several thousand circulars all over the county and the handling of an immense amount of advertising matter. The committees have secured for this purpose the rooms which were formerly occupied by the land office in the federal building. These rooms were turned over to the committees by Postmaster McEvoy, and they make ideal headquarters, and are certainly appreciated.

The ladies start this week in addressing out the circulars that will be sent out every week until the drive starts.

Birthday Party

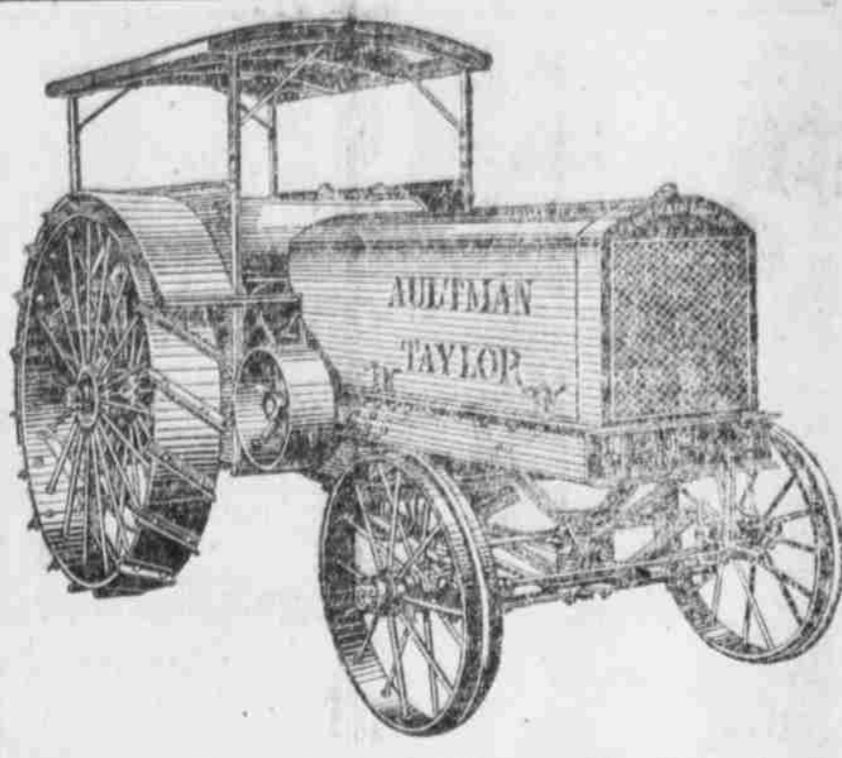

ROOSEVELT ROUGH RIDERS IN ACTION IN SCREEN STORY OF CAREER OF THEIR ORGANIZER

"The Fighting Roosevelts at the Sun Theatre Shows, How Teddy Led Them in Battle."

Scenes of the famous Roosevelt Rough Riders in action are a part of the historical incidents in "The Fighting Roosevelts," the authorized version of the life and works of the former president, to be shown at the Sun theatre Tuesday and Wednesday. This special feature attraction, which is a visualized history of the career of Colonel Roosevelt, shows not only the manner in which the late Mr. Roosevelt, then the Assistant Secretary of the Navy, recruited his regiment of Rough Riders from the plains of the west, but also the facts of how they fought, and the platoon's tactics they employed in their several engagements during the Spanish-American War.

Gets News of Maine Sinking. Immediately following Mr. Roosevelt's announcement to President McKinley and the cabinet that the Maine had been sunk in the Havana harbor, he is pictured tendering his resignation as Assistant Secretary of the Navy, and offering his services for action in Cuba.

Then he sent word to his former associates of the cattle lands and their response was instantaneous. Cowboys, ranchmen, gold miners and plasmens of every character, hardened and rugged from outdoor life, more at home in the saddle than on foot, and trained by life-long experience to ride hard and shoot straight, said good-bye to their wives and families and hastened to the place of mobilization.

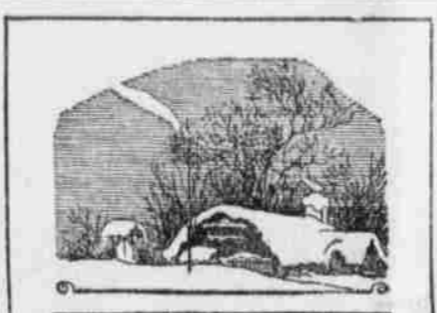

Get Last of Casualty Lists.

The last of the casualty lists are now being published in the American press and hereafter the lists published will be made up almost entirely of men who have died of disease, been injured since the armistice was signed, and those dying of wounds received in battle months ago. The names of a few given as killed in action are those men for whom it is necessary to make an extended investigation to establish cause of death. They are mostly those men injured beyond recognition. Daily casualty lists will continue indefinitely, however, being forthcoming as long as the expeditionary force remains in France and elsewhere.
