MARCH WEATHER.

We passed through March without any severe storms and without the temperature reaching the zero mark. The mean temperature for the month was two degrees warmer than the normal for the month. The coldest March day we have ever had was twenty-one below zero.

The precipitation for the month was forty-four one hundredths of an inch, as compared with thirty-two one hundredths in March of last year and 1.48 inches in March 1917. The normal for the month is eighty-seven one hundredths of an inch. The wettest March we have ever had was in 1912 when the precipitation amounted to 3.08 inches
