## WOMEN IN POLITICS.

The entrance of women into politics in North Platte Tuesday resulted in the most sweeping victory the city has ever known, as is evidenced by the fact that A. F. Stretz, the candidate they most heartily supported for mayor was elected by a vote nearly 200 greater than the combined vote of the other three candidates. The total vote cast by the women was nearly if not altogether as large as that cast by the men, which disproves the assertion so frequently made that women would not avail themselves of suffrage were such accorded them. It is true that in the election Tuesday there was an issue that strongly appealed to them, yet even had this issue not been so strongly presented we are confident the woman vote would have fairly strong.

In entering the campaign the women recognized the value of a thorough solidification of their forces and proceeding along this line builded an organization that could not have been stronger nor more efficient. They appointed as members of their committee women of known energy and influence a house to house canvass was made and on election day they saw to it that every woman who was favorable to Mr. Stretz got to the polls and voted. Their organization as a whole was as perfect and as effectual as any we have ever known in city or county politics.

The appointment of two women in each ward as judges and clerks of election produced an air of refinement at the voting places, and the difference in the general demeanor of the men voters as compared with previous years was noticeable.

The Tribune is mightily pleased that the women evinced such an interest Tuesday and it hopes that the same interest will be taken in future elections.

## MARCH WEATHER.

We passed through March without any severe storms and without the temperature reaching the zero mark. The mean temperature for the month was two degrees warmer than the normal for the month. The coldest March day we have ever had was twenty-one below zero.

The precipitation for the month was forty-four one hundredths of an inch, as compared with thirty-two one hundredths in March of last year and 1.48 inches in March 1917. The normal for the month is eighty-seven one hundredths of an inch. The wettest March we have ever had was in 1912 when the precipitation amounted to 3.08 inches.

## ORGANIZE RAILROAD MEN FOR VICTORY LOAN CAMPAIGN

A railroad organization which includes representatives of every branch of the service from the director general to the last man in the yards, will handle the victory liberty loan campaign of the railroads of the country.

"It is the intention that every employe of the railroad should be urged personally to subscribe for as large an amount of victory liberty loan notes as possible," says the general bulletin, which gives instructions for the formation of the army which will put the loan across.

Terminal and shop committees will be composed of three or more officers and men and in shop subcommittees to reach employes in all outlying shops and repair shops.

A detailed method of securing daily reports of the subscriptions of the rail systems has been worked out. Two features are named essential: Total subscriptions of officers and employes are to be made known promptly to the general committee of the railroad; total subscriptions are to be made known to the county victory liberty loan organization in such detail as will enable the latter to allocate the subscriptions to the communities.

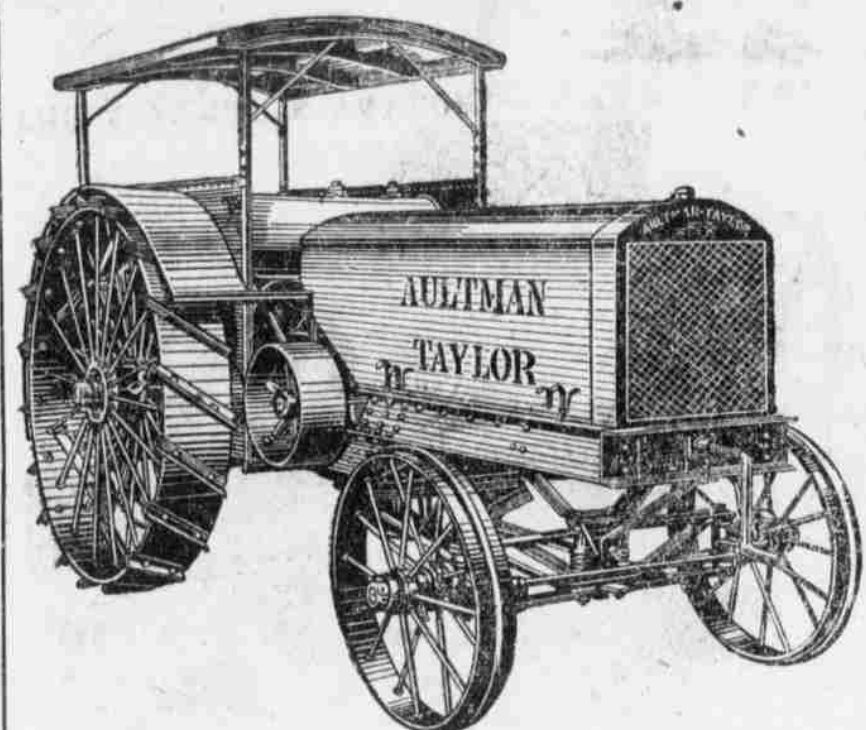
