STREITZ WINS MAYORSHIP BY OVERWHELMING MAJORITY

Streizt 1139, Pizer 435, Stone 405, Lock 123; Streit's majority over all other candidates combined 176. For Sunday moving pictures 837, against 1086. For members board of education Mrs. Cramer 1398, Mrs. Snyder 1178, Van Cleave 705, Shuman 608. Councilmen elected: First ward Carl Simon, Second Howard McMichael, Third Elmer Coates, Fourth Leslie Baskins. Candidates elected who had no opposition: O. E. Elder for clerk, Roy Mehlmann for treasurer, Hershey Welch for water commissioner.

The above in brief tells the story of the city election held Tuesday; an election which was marked by the strong fight between Pizer and Stone for second place, by the majority received by Streit, the largest ever given a candidate for mayor, and by the wonderful outpouring of women voters. There was never a time during the short campaign that there was any question of the election of Mr. Streit, for it was well known that he was backed by an efficiently organized force numerically strong and potentially influential. As this was apparent to the supporters of both Pizer and Stone, neither of whom could be forced to withdraw, though many attempts were made, the contest between these two candidates became a fight for second place. Both played the game of politics and for a week the strength of each was pretty well balanced. One day the Pizer forces would apparently show stronger than those of Stone, the next day the reverse would prove true, and thus the battle surged, Pizer finally winning out by besting Stone by thirty votes.

The day was rainy, and it was feared during the forenoon that the army of women who favored Streit might not reach the polls. It was then that the telephones of the Streit committee got busy. "Get out to vote if it wet," was the advice, and from each phone came the cheering reply: "Indeed I will"—and they did—and Mr. Streit was the beneficiary of the votes of not less than five hundred women—perhaps a good many more.

No accurate account of the women voting was kept, but in at least two of the wards there were more women voters than men. It is probable that of the 2102 votes that were cast fully one-half were by women. It was certainly a great day for "the girls;" it was their first opportunity to cast their ballot for a complete city ticket; they accepted the privilege as a right that had long been denied them, they voted numerically strong, and each voted her preference with the conviction that it was her duty as a good citizen to place the cross where she did, whether that cross was in front of the name of Streit, Pizer, Stone or Lock.

Burton Adjudged Insane

A. C. Burton, for thirty years a resident of Medicine precinct, and for two years past living in this city, had a hearing before the insanity board Saturday and was adjudged insane. He was taken to the asylum at Lincoln Sunday night. For a number of years Burton had been looked upon as eccentric, and his actions and talk of late became more pronounced along this line. During the winter he got into all kinds of trouble with people in the Fourth ward, where he resided, and once or twice it was necessary to place him under arrest. He was considered a menace, and at the instigation of the family Sheriff Saltburg fled an insanity charge against him and it was sustained by the board. During the past few years Burton has made considerable money and financially is well-to-do.

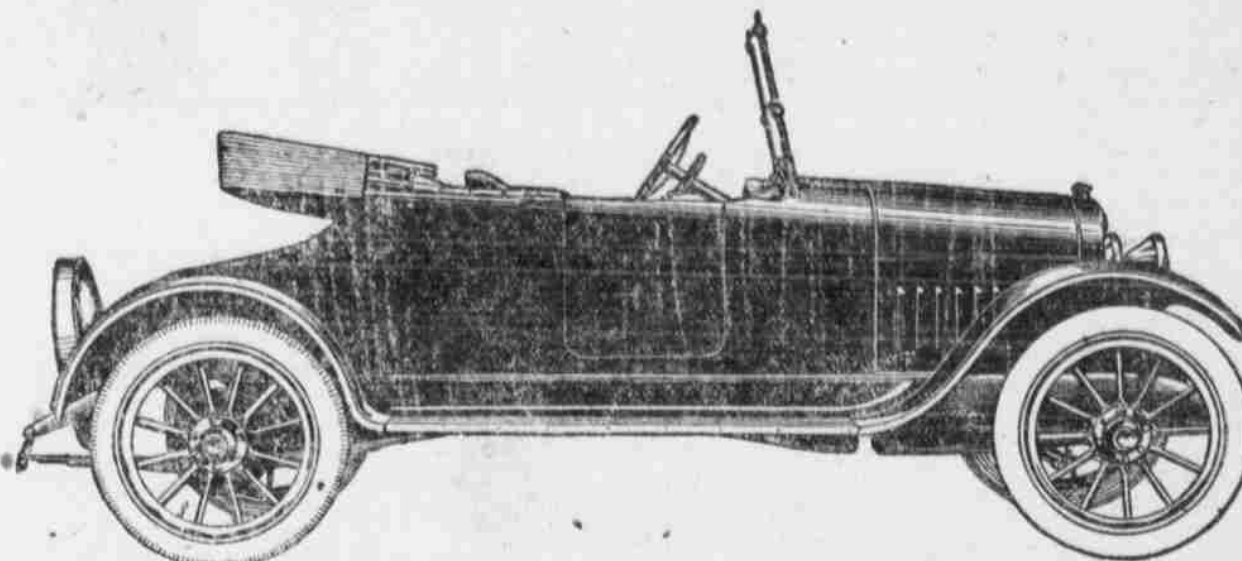

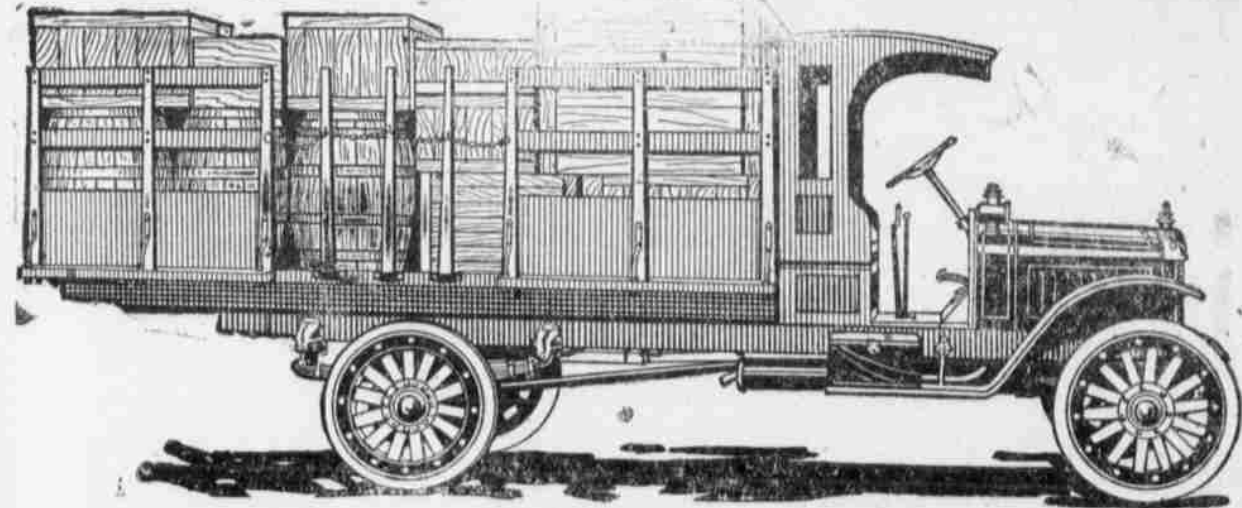

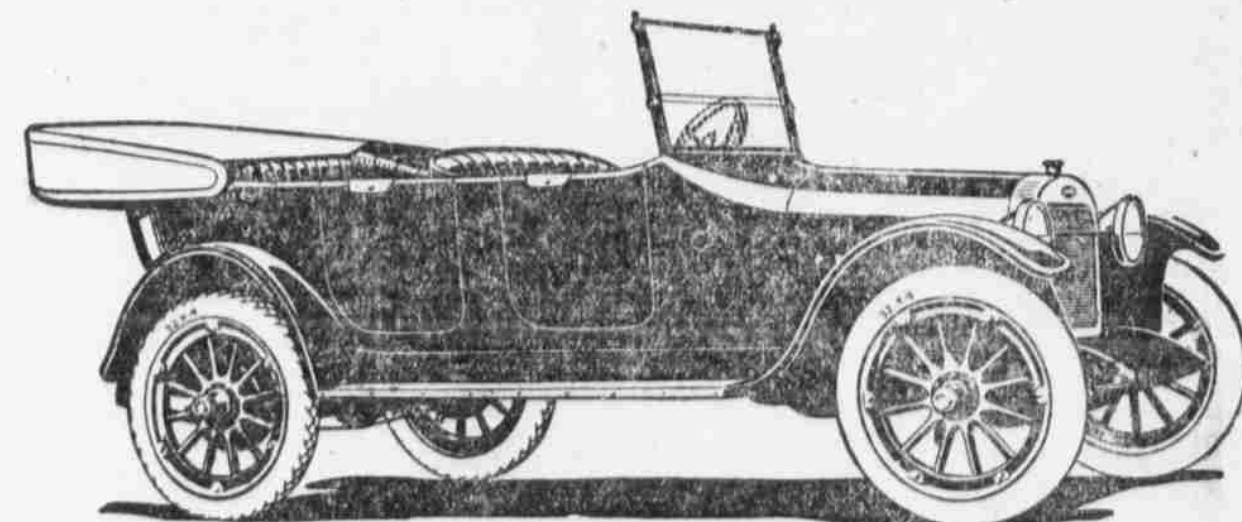
