SERGT. LEONARD ROBINSON WILL SOON BE HOME

Under the heading of "Nebraskans in New York," the Sunday State Journal published the following:

Sergt. Leonard Robinson, of North Platte visited at the Nebraska room in the Hall of States Wednesday afternoon. Sergeant Robinson arrived in New York March 8. After two days at Grand Central hospital he was transferred to the hospital at Ellis Island from which he was released Monday. He went overseas with the first American troops and was with one of the four regiments reviewed by King George. He was assigned with the Thirteenth engineers, troop C, of the sixth cavalry.

North Platte is one of the few cities which gave a father and a son for service. The younger Mr. Robinson, Leonard M., is with the Thirty-second aero squadron arriving in New York this week. He and his father met in Issoudun last November for the first time since they enlisted. Through the Nebraska headquarters Sergeant Robinson received the glad news that the Thirty-second aero squadron would arrive in New York April 3. "And I'll be there when the boat comes in," was his comment. When the name of another North Platte man, Chas. Hazen, was seen on the Nebraska register, as a hospital patient at D. H. No. 3, Sergeant Robinson went at once to call upon him, but Mr. Hazen had left the hospital in the morning for Camp Dodge. While in New York Sergeant Robinson, who is also a Spanish war veteran, received an invitation from Lincoln to attend a meeting of the European war veterans. He left Ellis Island Thursday for Camp Merritt and expects to be released from service within the next two weeks.

LLOYD AND NELLIS TIE IN THE MOTORCYCLE RACE

In the motorcycle race to Gothenburg and return, staged Sunday by John Null, the Locust street motorcycle and bicycle dealer, Archie Lloyd and Art Nellis tied for first place, each making a perfect score within the speed schedule of twenty-five miles an hour. Dick Carroll took second place, twelve minutes late, and Nelson Blood reached home fourth. Gordon Love reached Brady on the return trip but had trouble with the gas connection. Bob Davis and "Dutch" Elias reached Gothenburg, but had so much trouble that they did not attempt the return trip.

There were thirteen entries and eleven starters in the race. The starters not mentioned above had trouble in the early part of the race and went down and out.

The round trip distance is eighty-six miles.
