WILL ORGANIZE CAMP OF AMERICAN LEGION WEDNESDAY

The Tribune is requested to announce that a meeting will be held at the Franklin auditorium at eight o'clock Thursday evening for the purpose of organizing a camp of the American Legion and to request the attendance of all soldiers and sailors of Lincoln county. All soldiers and sailors who have been in the service overseas or in home camps are eligible to membership in the Legion and are urged to be present at the meeting. Camps of the Legion are now being formed by the boys overseas as well as by those in the larger towns and the cities here at home and the camp at Omaha has requested an organization in this county as well as in every county in the state. After the counties are organized delegates will be sent to a general meeting to be held at Omaha or some other point where a state department will be organized. Every state in the union will be organized and the general plan of formation will probably be along the line of the Grand Army of the Republic, the membership of which was composed of the survivors of the northern army in the civil war. The G. A. R. before its ranks were decimated by deaths due to advanced age of the members, was the most powerful organization this country has ever known and did more to keep alive the spirit of patriotism for country than any other agency. The American Legion can, and no doubt will, prove just as beneficial to the country. It is hoped that every returned soldier and sailor will make a special effort to be present at the meeting at the auditorium Wednesday evening.

VICTORY LOAN CAMPAIGN PROGRESSES RATHER SLOWLY

Up to last evening subscriptions to the Victory loan notes in Lincoln county so far as reported amounted to less than one hundred thousand dollars, more than four-fifths of which had been subscribed in the city. This represents the subscriptions up to last Saturday evening, and to say the least is not very encouraging nor does it indicate that Lincoln county will raise its quota. It is true that here in town the soliciting has not been completed, but so far as it has gone, the returns have not been as satisfactory as expected. Not many are refusing to subscribe, but the amount they take is so much less than in former campaigns that the total does not mount rapidly. Returns from the banks in the county outside of North Platte indicate that the campaign is also progressing slowly in the county precincts, these returns to date averaging about one-tenth of the quota that was allotted to the respective banks. Chairman Temple felt rather disappointed yesterday over the manner in which Lincoln county people were subscribing. They had done so well in previous campaigns that he was led to believe that the same enthusiasm would be shown in the present drive, extra effort will be made this week to induce the people to buy and to influence those who have already bought to buy more.

This afternoon he will speak to women and tonight on the important subject of a "Social Conscience." This Welfare League has a splendid program for both state and municipal welfare work. It proposes a city ordinance that will place all welfare work in the hands of a board of five. This committee is to be appointed by the mayor from candidates selected by various organizations of the city. Ten candidates will be appointed and from these the Mayor selects five. This board will have supervision of all municipal welfare work. Last evening a welfare committee of about twenty-five was selected. This committee consists of the following: Mayor A. F.
