Revised Covenant Published.

The revised covenant of nations was given to the press for publication yesterday, and while it has been greatly changed in phraseology, it is basically the same document as it was before the revision.

The most important real amendments to the league of nations constitution are: the provision that the executive council may vote an increase in its own membership, thus allowing for the admission of Germany and Russia when the time comes that their admission seems advisable; the article providing that a nation may withdraw from the league by giving a two years' notice of its intention of doing so; and the guarantee of independent sovereignty throughout the covenant.

Recruits for Overseas.

The first contingent of 1,000 recruits enlisted by the War department for foreign service to relieve men in the army of occupation will leave Camp Meade April 30 for New York preparatory to embarking. With this first unit will go a number of officers who have asked for foreign service to relieve officers in the American army in Germany.

Total Demobilization.

Reports on demobilization made public Saturday by the War department show a total of 1,832,523 officers and men released from the army to date, of whom 99,295 were in the commissioned grades. Orders have been issued for the demobilization of 1,975,099.

Overseas troops returned to the United States to date total 676,732.

Enlistments have now reached a total of 18,373.

Wilson Gets Public Boot

Hundreds of thousands of Italian citizens participated in wild anti-Wilson demonstrations in Rome, and neighboring cities, following the publication of his statement with regard to the Fiume. In the demonstration there was a curious division of sentiment, the people cheering for Americans, but hurling anathemas at their president.

"Hurrah for America. Down with Wilson," was the universal cry.

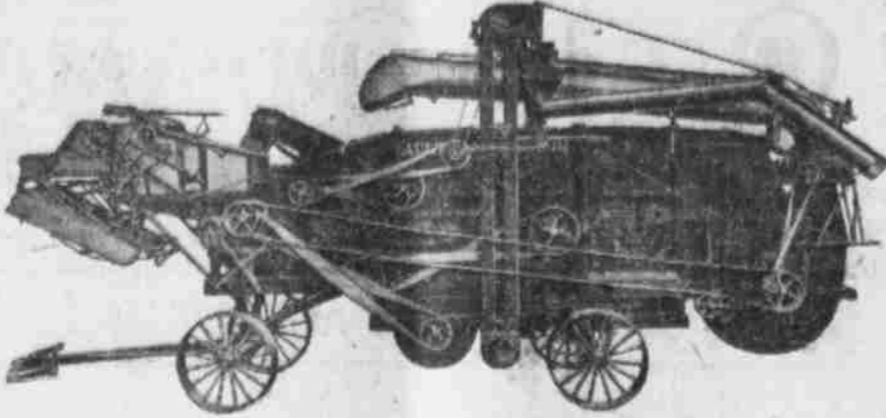
