## DIVISIONAL SAFETY FIRST MEETING HERE IN JUNE

Supt. Woodruff, of the Wyoming division who was in town Saturday, announced that the Wyoming division safety first meeting will be held in this city in June. This will be the first time a division meeting has been held in North Platte, and it will bring to the city from fifty to one hundred visitors, including railroad officials, government safety first men, and train, engine and track employees.

It will be an all-day meeting and will be held in one of the halls of the city that will accommodate a couple hundred people, as citizens will be invited to attend. In the evening a ride around the city will be given the visitors and this will probably be followed by a banquet and an entertainment of some sort.

This safety first movement which was inaugurated by the railroads five or six years ago has minimized the number of accidents to both employees and the public and it is considered of such importance that monthly meetings are held at all terminals, division meetings monthly at some point on the division, and regional meetings at intervals. At these meetings plans for safeguarding lives and property are discussed, and the need of carefulness impressed upon the employees. In the safety first movement the public is asked to co-operate with the railroads but the response, we understand, has not been hearty.

In every phase of industrial work the government is instituting a campaign for safety first but perhaps in no other line has this work reached the high state of development that is now in working order on the railroads under Uncle Sam's control.

Formerly the larger of these safety meetings on railroad systems were held at division headquarters but in order to more thoroughly acquaint the people with the methods and importance of this work it has been decided to hold these gatherings from time to time at different important terminals throughout the year.

Detailed plans of the session to be held in North Platte will be forthcoming at an early date and when these have been furnished it will behoove North Platte to see that these attending officers and employees are treated in a manner befitting guests of our town and the meeting made such a success that our city will be further sought out along this line.

The principal place of transacting business is in the City of North Platte, Lincoln County, Nebraska.

It shall have power to conduct its business in its principal place of business and at any branch office established by it, and to maintain an office of said corporation within the State of Nebraska, or in any other part of the United States, District of Columbia and the United States territories.

The authorized capital stock is \$25,000.00, \$10,000.00 of which is fully paid, the balance to be sold and payable subject to the order of the Board of Directors.

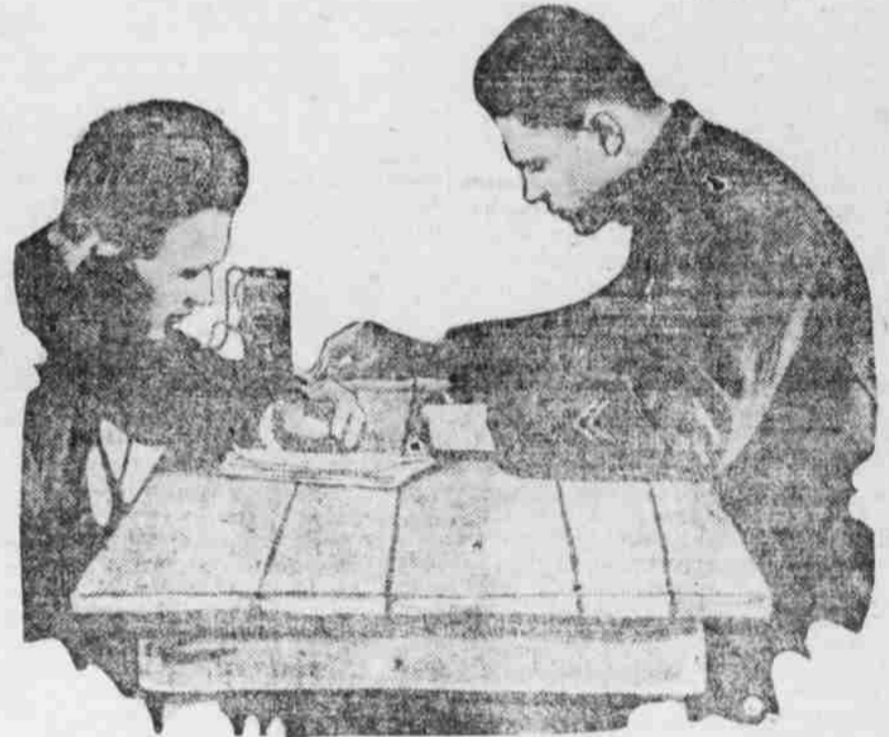
