

**300,000 TROOPS WILL BE HOME THIS MONTH**

The American expeditionary forces are to be reduced to an army of occupation along the Rhine solely. Three hundred thousand troops will be transported to the United States in May, and a similar number during the month of June, after which American controlled railroads will be returned to France and American police withdrawn. No French ports will be used by the Americans after July 1, Antwerp being the American base of supplies and all troops shipments coming through Belgium.

**Italy to Come Back.**

The Italian delegates to the peace conference, who left Paris abruptly when the council of four refused to grant Italy's full claims in Fiume and the Dalmatian coasts, have been invited to resume their places in the peace conference. These dispatches say it is believed the Italians will return to the French capital and that the negotiations on the disputed points will begin again. French and British diplomats in Rome for several days have been discussing the controversy with Premier Orlando and Foreign Minister Sonnino in an endeavor to straighten out the tangle. The invitation of the council of three, it is understood, has in view the elimination of the personal element in the controversy and the paving of the way for a territorial adjustment acceptable to Italy when the conferees are again together.

**TREASURER GLASS ASKS AID FOR VICTORY LOAN**

The Victory Liberty Loan campaign is two-thirds over, but subscriptions have been reported for little more than one-third of the loan. It is conceivable that the American people, who with heart and soul waged the fight for freedom, will permit this loan of victory and thanksgiving to fail? Our sons gave of their health, of their strength and of their lives that freedom might not perish. There are one and a half million American boys in France and Germany. Now that the war is ended it would be as reasonable for them to dishonor the nation by deserting the flag as for the nation to dishonor itself by deserting them. Is it a large thing that we are now asked to lend our money to pay the cost of victory? Is American money less willing than American manhood?

**Harvest Wages in Kansas.**

Wheat growers from 35 western Kansas counties have adopted a harvest wage schedule of 50 cents an hour for a 10-hour day, with extra pay for overtime. This wage applies to shockers, barge men, pitchers and helpers around stacks, drivers of headers and binders. Men with teams will receive 70 cents an hour, and stackers 60 cents.

Morrill Davis returned Monday from the army, having seen active service in France. Morrill was wounded twice, one bullet piercing his right arm below the elbow breaking a bone and leaving a nasty scar. This scar was made much worse because of an operation due to poisoning. The other wound was in the left arm where he was hit by a piece of shrapnel, and is slight. He is feeling fine now, has grown to a fine physique, and will soon be none the worse for the wear and tear of army life.

Amos Ross arrived the first of the week, having received his discharge from the army. He was with the 89th Div., which was the first All American boys to scrap the Hun. He went over the top in the St. Mihiel sector among the first, was wounded in seven different places, saw many of our boys killed by getting into their own barrage, so anxious were they to get at the Hun; saw young Barnes, of North Platte, killed when he was struck by a shell; was a bundle of Otto Johnson, of Sutherland, from the time they left up until the time the latter was killed. Amos had some thrilling experiences and is fortunate he is still all-together.

W. H. Blount returned the latter part of last week from a visit with his mother in Lexington.

Mrs. Regina Herrod, who has been in a critical condition, is reported to be improving.

Mrs. Mary Giesert, who has been visiting in the western part of the state, is expected home in a few days.
