GENERAL ARRANGEMENTS FOR MEMORIAL DAY OBSERVANCE.

Attention is called to Memorial Day, May 30th, and Memorial Sunday, May 25th. At a meeting of the conference committees of the G. A. R. and W. R. C. last Saturday arrangements were made to have all the churches and patriotic societies and citizens join in Memorial services at the Franklin Auditorium at 8 o'clock P. M. Sunday, May 25th. All the ministers of the city are specially invited to be present at such meeting and are kindly requested to refrain from holding services in their respective churches during that evening, and to ask their members to attend the memorial service.

Comrade T. C. Patterson was selected as a committee with full charge of all arrangements for the Sunday Memorial Service.

On Memorial Day

A parade is to be organized at 9 A. M. at the court house square by Captains Shilling, Vic Halligan and Leonard Robinson, who were selected as a committee with full charge of every detail regarding the parade. It is desired that all veterans of the Civil war, Spanish American war, World war and high school cadets, the W. R. C., Red Cross, Sammy Girls, pupils of our public schools, civic societies and citizens generally take part in the parade either as marchers or in automobiles, and all persons who are willing to furnish auto accommodations for the ladies of the several societies, and aged veterans, are requested to report the number they can carry to the parade committee on or before May 29th, and have their autos near the court house square at 9 A. M. May 30th.

The march will be to the cemetery, where the graves of all deceased soldiers of all wars there found will be decorated under the supervision of the W. R. C., which has charge of the flowers and decoration exercises.

A short G. A. R. memorial service will be held at the G. A. R. plot in the cemetery, and service by the W. R. C. for the unknown dead.

Comrade J. F. Schmalzreid is in charge of procuring flags and Comrade Ashley Peters will see that each soldier's grave is properly marked.

Comrade Arthur Hammond is placed in full charge of the decoration of soldier's graves in the South Side Cemetery with power to select assistants for such duty.

Comrade J. E. Evans will have charge of the public memorial exercises at the Franklin auditorium at 2:30 P. M. and the program for such exercises will be prepared by Mr. Evans and Mrs. Ward. All patriotic citizens should attend this meeting in memory of those who gave their lives, that we might live, might peacefully enjoy our rights of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.

McPherson National Cemetery. Eight hundred and sixty-seven soldiers lie beneath the grassy mounds in the beautiful cemetery at old Ft. McPherson, twenty miles east of this city. It is the only National Cemetery in Nebraska and under a law of the G. A. R. of this state it is the duty of the Department Commander to make the Memorial Day address at such cemetery or furnish a substitute. Therefore J. S. Hoagland, the present Department Commander of the G. A. R., will make the principal memorial address at McPherson. Major Leonard A. Hill, in charge of the National Cemetery will co-operate with Comrade Hoagland in arranging a program for decorating graves there from 11 A. M. to noon and exercises of music and speaking will commence at 1:30 P. M. Mrs. Beula Davis, of Omaha, President of the W. R. C., Department of Nebraska, is expected to be present and take part in the exercises at the National Cemetery. Everybody is invited and there will no doubt be a large crowd of patriotic people there to honor the memory of our dead heroes. If there are some singers in North Platte who contemplate going to the National Cemetery on Memorial Day, and will kindly consent to assist on the program, they will please make themselves known as soon as possible to J. S. Hoagland, by letter or phone.

This, the first Memorial Day after the close of the most destructive war in the history of the world should be the most impressive, the most important and of greater interest to our people than any ever before observed. Three wars have been bravely fought for the right of our people to enjoy life, liberty and self government. Three times has victory been written in the history of Old Glory with the blood of our brave soldiers. Our victory in the war just ended has been so decisive against the rule of kings, emperors and military autocrats, that the world's people are beginning to realize that bloody and destructive wars of aggression cannot longer be tolerated and that peaceful means must be found to prevent future wars between nations. Such charming conditions will no doubt be brought about as a result of this war. The price paid for such victory has been enormous. Many thousands of our brave brothers and sons have given their precious lives for our comfort and happiness, and the memory of their supreme sacrifice impels us to honor them and resolve that our noble dead should never have died in vain.

TERMS OF TREATY MADE TO GERMANS

The treaty which Germany is asked to sign calls upon her not to respect any understanding with any of her allies held prior to this time.

The Germans must restore all devastated Belgium, France and other territory invaded by her army.

Germany must accept internationalization of the Saar valley. Internationalization of Dantzig is also insisted upon. German must make certain territorial concessions to Denmark and Belgium, to protect their future.

The Germans must renounce all territorial claims and confine herse if to Europe, even politically.

The German army is limited to one hundred thousand men and officers. Conscription is to be abolished. All German fortifications within fifty miles of the Rhine must be dismantled. Allied occupation of Germany to remain in force until all peace requirements are met with.

The German navy reduced to six battleships, twelve cruisers, no submarines. Building of additional fortifications forbidden. All Heligoland forts to be dismantled. Kiel canal fortifications dismantled and canal open to all commercially.

Germany must reimburse the allies for all property damage done, the first payment to be twenty billion dollars. All allied shipping destroyed must be restored, ton for ton. The ex-kaiser must be tried by a military international court and Germany must also give up for trial any others implicated in bringing about the war.

No Back Pay Coming.
 Judge O. D. Wheeler in a decision just handed down in district court at Council Bluffs rules that night yard masters do not come within the provisions of the Adamson law. The decision was in the case of Charles E. Thompson, against the Union Pacific railroad company and Director Hines, in which Thompson sued to recover \$1,306 as back pay, under the act, covering a period of employment from January 1, 1917, when the law went into effect, to February 23, 1918. He was employed as night yard master in Council Bluffs.
