A number of railroad employes and business men held a meeting Friday evening and made preliminary arrangements for the division safety first meeting which will be held in this city Wednesday, June 11th. At this meeting there will be present Union Pacific officials, government safety first officials and employes to the number of sixty or seventy, and included among the officials will be General Manager Jeffers, Supt. Woodruff, and perhaps President Calvin. Nearly all those present will come from the Wyoming division.

Committees were appointed to arrange for all the necessary details, which include autos for a ride around the city and out to the state farm, halls in which to hold the business meeting and the banquet, arrange the speakers' list and the sale of banquet tickets to railroad employes and business men. Covers for two hundred will be laid at the banquet.

The business meeting in the afternoon will be open to the public and it is hoped that many of our citizens will attend.

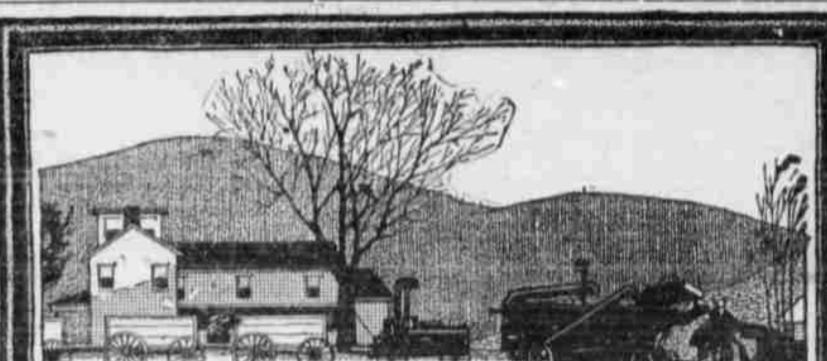
