

### FEDERAL COURT WILL BE HELD HERE NEXT WEEK.

Judge Woodrugh and his federal court officials will be here next Monday to hold a session that may continue throughout the week. On the docket are about thirty criminal cases, nearly all of the defendants being charged with a violation of the liquor laws. A number of these men have already been convicted in the county court and paid the fines assessed, but must now face Judge Woodrugh on the charge of fracturing the federal prohibition law in transporting liquor from a wet to a dry state. These violators may not get off quite so easy in the federal court as they did in the county courts in which they were arraigned.

A letter received yesterday by P. C. Peterson stated that his son Sergeant Fred Peterson is in a base hospital at Nenenahr, Germany, recovering from an operation for appendicitis, which was performed May 16th. He was reported as getting along nicely when the letter was written. The Fourth division, to which Fred belongs, was due to leave Germany for home May 27th, but it was not expected that Fred would be able to leave at that time. This will probably delay his arrival home for a month or more.

### THIS CITY PROBABLE LANDING SITE IN PLANE FLIGHT

Lieut. Conklin, of the Omaha balloon school, spent yesterday in town seeking a landing place for an airplane flight from New York to San Francisco which will be made under government supervision. The plane selected to make the flight is one of the bombing models, propelled by four 800 horse power Liberty motors, with a tank capacity for 700 gallons of gasoline, fifty gallons of oil and manned by fourteen men. The plane will start on its flight as soon after June 10th as the weather will permit. Three landings will be made, the first at Chicago, the second at North Platte, and the third at or near Ogden.

Lieut. Conklin was driven out to the Country Club grounds, and also to a tract of land east of the river, by Messrs. Carroll and Pennington, which were suggested as possible landing sites, and Lieut. Conklin will recommend one of these two sites.

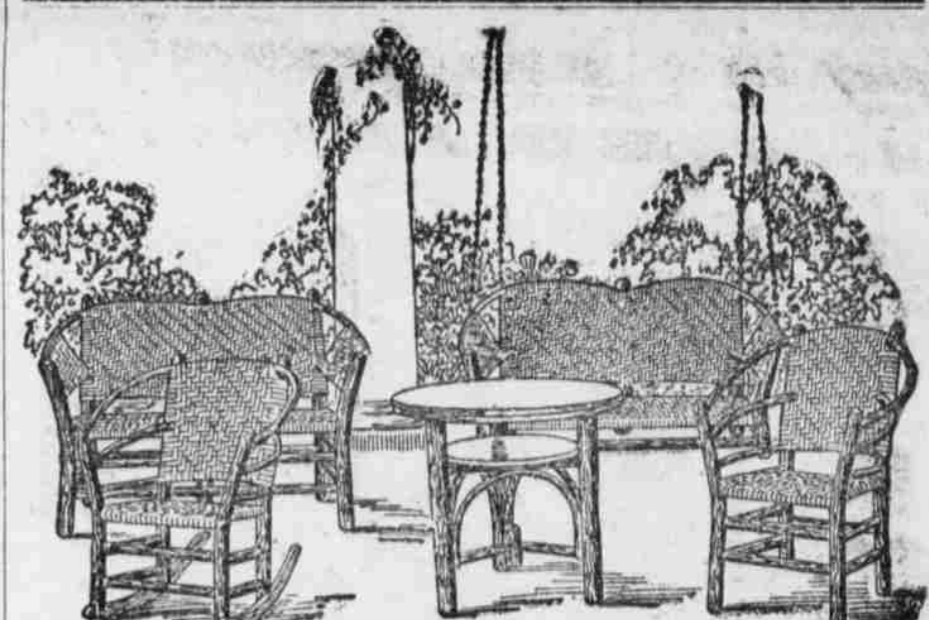
