EPISCOPAL CONVOCATION NOW IN SESSION IN THE CITY

The twenty-ninth annual convocation of the Episcopal Missionary District of Western Nebraska convened this morning, and will hold morning, afternoon and evening sessions today, tomorrow and Thursday.

About sixty delegates are present, including clergymen, laymen and women, the latter attending what is termed the House of Churchwomen at which is discussed the women's phases of church work.

The convocation will be conducted by Bishop Beecher, of Hastings, and opened this morning at 7:30 with a celebration of the holy communion followed by a breakfast at which the clergymen were the guests of the Bishop. This forenoon Rev. J. J. Dixon, dean of the Valentine deanery read a paper on "The Teaching Mission of the Church," followed by a general discussion. This afternoon Rev. J. M. Bates, of Red Cloud, and Rev. C. R. Tyner, of Hastings, will read papers and this evening Rev. C. C. Rollitt, of Minneapolis will deliver a public address on "The Nation-Wide Campaign."

Tomorrow forenoon and afternoon will be given over largely to women's work, including conferences, reading of reports, papers by Mrs. Guttererson of Broken Bow and Mrs. R. O. Mackintosh of this city, and the election of officers. In the evening a public service will be held with a sermon by Rev. James Kirkpatrick, of Washington, D. C.

Thursday the convocation will take up business matters, which will include the Bishop's annual address at 10 a. m., and the election of officers and the appointment of committees. In the evening there will be a confirmation service followed by a social gathering at the parish house.
