John Henry Federhoof, aged seventy-four years and six months, passed away Friday afternoon at his home on east Fifth street following a stroke of paralysis suffered ten days previously. The funeral was held at the Masonic hall Sunday afternoon, conducted by the Masonic fraternity, of which he was a member.

John Federhoof had been a resident of North Platte for thirty-four years, coming here from Pennsylvania in 1885. For a year after his arrival he acted as night clerk at the Nebraska House, then conducted by his brother J. C. Federhoof. He then purchased the cigar and confectionery store conducted by Claude Weingand on Front street and until about four years ago, continued in that business. During his business career he accumulated considerable money and was considered well-to-do.

He leaves a wife but no children.

Complete Road Grading.

Big, husky, hearty and happy Charley Leyboldt, who has charge of the grading outfit in Commissioner Koch's district, has completed making twenty-two miles of road in the valley north of the river. Ten miles of these roadways were rebuilt, the other twelve miles were made from bottom to top. North side residents who travel these roads are jubilant over their condition, and as token of their appreciation recently sent Leyboldt a blue ribbon, signifying that as a road builder he is a prize winner.

This grading outfit will be moved today to O'Fallon where two miles of road will be graded, one-half of the expense of which will be borne by the Great Western Sugar Company.

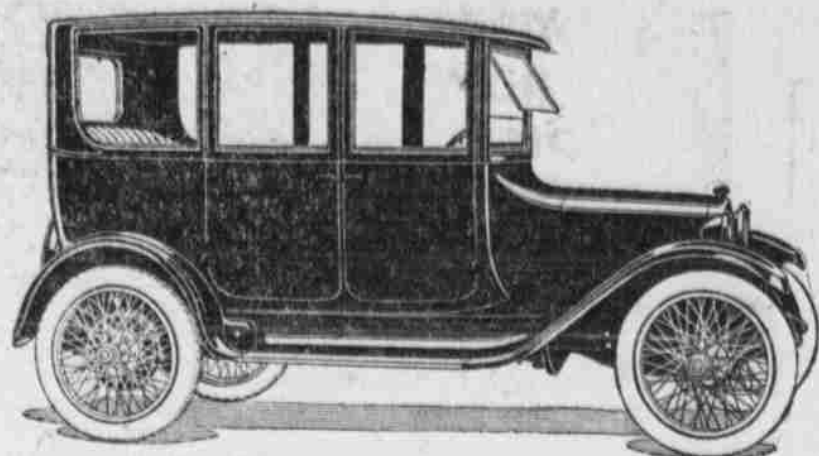
