## Arranging for Labor Day.

Committees appointed by the North Platte Central Labor Union started this week to make arrangements for a celebration on Labor Day, Monday, September 1st. The tentative plans include a parade in the forenoon, an address at the court house park, athletic events and a base ball game at the city park in the afternoon and a dance in the evening.

## Calls Primary Election.

Elsewhere County Clerk Allen issues a proclamation calling for a primary election on Tuesday, September 16th at the usual polling places in the county for the purpose of nominating candidates for delegates to the constitutional convention. There are three candidates in the field, namely, W. T. Wilcox, J. G. Beeler and Wm. E. Bright and of these three the two receiving the highest vote will be declared nominated and will stand as the candidates at the November election.

## Dickey Buys Creamery.

The North Platte Creamery, owned by Theodore Meyer and Elmer Selter, has been purchased by R. R. Dickey, for a consideration of \$20,000, the sale including the building, the machinery and the stock of merchandise on hand. Mr. Dickey will operate the creamery as a butter making plant and will also consolidate his ice cream making plant in his bakery building with the creamery plant, increasing the production of both butter and ice cream.

## Teachers Institute Next Month.

County Supt. Cochran will in a few days send out formal announcement of the Lincoln County Teachers' Institute which will be held in the high school building September 1st to 5th. Dr. Chas. McKenny, president of the Michigan state normal college will be a member of the institute faculty, and will lecture daily. Miss Alice Henggan, a primary teacher in the Lincoln schools, will demonstrate primary reading methods with a class of beginners, and will also teach penmanship. Mrs. M. H.
