

HERSHEY WILL HAVE SUGAR FACTORY FOR 1920 CROP.

Reliable information received in North Platte Saturday stated that the American Beet Sugar Co. will complete four additional sugar factories in Nebraska and Colorado within the next year and that one of the four will be erected at Hershey. It is the intention to rush work on these factories so that they can work up the 1920 crop of beets.

The factory site at Hershey was purchased a couple of years ago, and there never has been any question as to the ultimate erection of the plant. It has been only a question of time conditioned on the status of affairs following the close of the war. The American Company evidently believes that business will go along as usual and that it is justified in erecting the new factories.

The Tribune congratulates Hershey that its dream of a sugar factory is to come true. It is a logical site for such an industry, and it means that the village will multiply many times in population. Not only will Hershey be benefited, but land tributary to the town is certain to increase in value, and with the growth of the town a better market for the farmers of that section will result. The erection of the factory means a largely increased acreage of beets, and a correspondingly larger circulation of money, a portion of which must naturally drift to North Platte. In fact the building of a sugar factory at Hershey will prove beneficial, one way or another, to the whole county.

High Cited for Bravery.

John High, who for ten years lived south of Hershey, and who lately returned from service overseas, terminated a furlough here yesterday and returned to Camp Dodge. While in Germany he re-enlisted for another year of service and at present is stationed at Camp Dodge as a member of a military police company. He participated in the Meuse-Argonne offensive and was cited for bravery. For twenty-six consecutive days he was on the firing line, and for two days was without water or food, and during the entire twenty-six days did not have a shelter tent or a blanket. In one instance a bursting shell killed or wounded fifteen men out of a squad of sixteen, he being the only survivor.

He has nine months yet to serve, and when discharged will go to Norway to visit his parents, and then return to Lincoln county.

Chicken Season Opens Oct. 15th.

County Clerk Allen is in receipt of a letter from the state secretary of agriculture which says:

"I wish to call your particular attention to the new provision in the game law as enacted by the regular session of the legislature relating to the open season on prairie chickens. The old law provided an open season from September 15th to November 15th. The new law provides this open season to be from October 15th to November 15th inclusive. The open season for any other game birds is unchanged, being the same as provided in the Session Laws of 1917.

"The force of regular game wardens will be increased by a number of Federal Game Wardens as well as the law enforcement officers of the state and all of the various inspectors in the Department of Agriculture. Every effort will be made to prosecute offenders who violate provisions of this law before the open season begins."

Fight Against Profiteers.

Here are some of the things that have been taking place during the last few days in other cities, as the result of activities by federal, city and county officials, to combat profiteers:

Detroit—10,460,000 eggs and 300,000 pounds of butter seized.

Chicago—\$50,000 worth of butter seized and warrants issued for sugar profiteers.

Chattanooga—More than 1,000,000 eggs seized.

Jacksonville—1,000,000 eggs, 27,500 pounds of sugar and thousands of tins of canned goods seized.

Tampa—326,000 tins of canned goods, 4,000 cases of eggs, and quantities of sugar and flour seized.

St. Louis—16,569,260 eggs seized; also sugar and butter.

Nashville—1,000,000 eggs seized.

Canton, O.—200,000 pounds of sugar seized.

San Diego—\$250,000 worth of eggs, butter and cheese seized.

Kansas City—75,000 pounds of beans seized.

Toledo—Eggs, sugar and butter seized.

New York—Mayor Hylan ordered all cold storage and warehouses inspected by firemen for hoarding of food supplies.

Ohio—100 indicted under storage and anti-trust laws; federal authorities asked to seize 2,420,000 pounds of meat. Material reductions of prices noted in various cities and towns.

Governor Cox asked railroad administration to impose time limit on cars kept on track.

Birmingham, Ala.—Grocer fined \$500; profiteering.

Los Angeles, Ventura, Santa Barbara, Fresno and Bakersfield—Butter, eggs and cheese seized.

Omaha—No changes except a slight boost in the price of bread and milk during the last few days.—Omaha Bee.

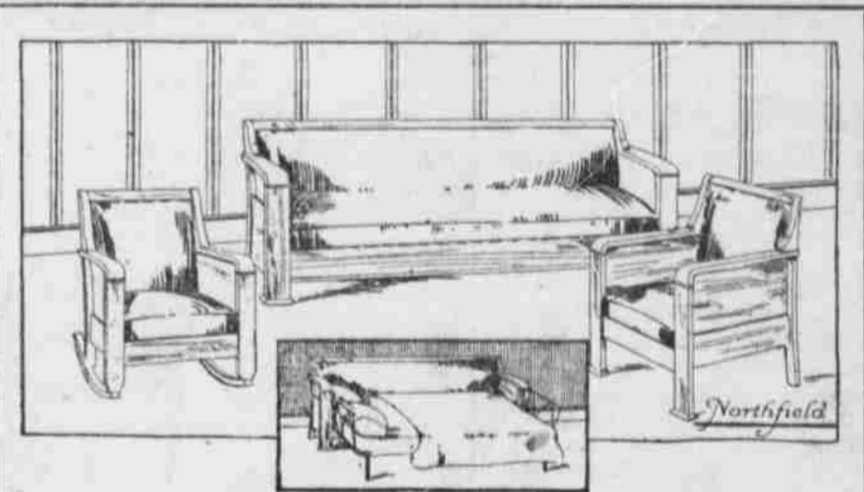
