

"MICKEY" IS COMING BACK TUESDAY AND WEDNESDAY

Auxiliary Water Plant.

The growth of North Platte and the consequent increase in the consumption of water has resulted in severely testing the capacity of the water plant. In fact the pump is now overtaxed. To lessen this tax on the plant and at the same time increase the water supply it is proposed to install an auxiliary plant having a capacity of one thousand gallons a minute. The city council has authorized Commissioner Welch to enter into a contract with the Kelly Well Co. for a test well on a small strip of land owned by the city at the corner of Dewey and A streets and if the flow of water is found sufficient the auxiliary plant will there be located. This auxiliary plant will have nearly one-half the capacity of the present plant and will therefore be a great aid in solving the water question.

The Cucumber Aphid.

Editor Tribune:—Several inquiries have come to the office the last few days regarding the control of the Cucumber Aphid or the so-called plant louse. This pest is a very small, green, soft bodied insect that is easily overlooked. The Aphid has sucking mouth parts and destroys the plant by extracting the juices. When the vines wilt and begin to turn brown it is pretty good evidence that the Aphid is present.

The most effective method of control is to spray the plants with a solution made by mixing a teaspoonful to a tablespoonful of Nicotine Sulphate or "Black Leaf 40" in a gallon of water. This is a contact insecticide and the Aphid must be hit by the spray to be killed. It can be applied with any hand sprayer.

To Park Cars on Dewey.

The problem of parking cars in the business section is being partially solved by permitting center parking on Dewey street between Fourth and Front—a distance of three blocks. Chief MeComber started in yesterday to lay out the park lines, not only those running north and south but also providing angling cross lines within which wheels of an auto must stand. With this provision for center parking, cars will not be allowed to park at the curb on either side of the street. So rapid has been the increase of cars that the parking of them has become a problem, and while center parking on Dewey was inaugurated with reluctance, it is believed it will prove more satisfactory than curb parking on that street.

BURGLARS BLOW UP SAFE IN THE MAXWELL POSTOFFICE

Word was telephoned to town early yesterday morning that the postoffice at Maxwell had been forcibly entered and the safe blown open. The amount of money secured could not be learned, but it was probably a considerable amount.

The burglars first visited a garage and secured an acetylene welding plant with which they attempted to burn out the lock. Failing in this they went to blacksmith shop and secured drills, and while at the shop discovered and took a gold watch which an employe had left in a garment. With the drills they made the necessary hole in the safe and for explosives used the powder from shot gun shells.

Securing such of the contents of the safe as they could use, the burglars then went to the Jens Sommers hardware store where the safe was cracked and about twenty dollars secured. The explosions were not heard by residents and the first intimation of the robbery was when the store and postoffice were opened yesterday morning.

The burglars left no clew which the officers might follow.
