### LABOR DAY WILL BE CELEBRATED MONDAY

Elsewhere is published the program for the Labor Day celebration under the auspices of the North Platte Central Labor Union. This is the first time organized labor in North Platte has attempted to celebrate Labor Day in a formal manner, and the program would indicate that the celebration will be a very successful one. Business houses are requested to close at ten o'clock in the forenoon and remain closed during the remainder of the day, and that this day be observed as a real holiday.

While the railroad brotherhoods and the shop employes' unions of the Union Pacific have had strong organizations in North Platte for many years, it is only within the past year or so that other mechanics and laborers have been unionized, and it was only last spring that the North Platte Central Labor Union, the "clearing house" of all the unions was created. As to the strength of union labor in North Platte it is only necessary to state that twenty-one distinct unions and brotherhoods are either members of, or affiliated with, the Central Labor Union, and that about ninety per cent of the wage earners in North Platte are included in these brotherhoods or unions, making this city one of the most strongly unionized towns in the west.

The Tribune speaks for the committee having in charge the celebration next Monday the assistance of the community at large, and in every way possible help make the day one of pleasure, instruction and recreation.

### SUPT. TOUT ANNOUNCES THE OPENING OF CITY SCHOOLS

The teachers for the city schools will arrive in North Platte next week. The new teachers must be located in the homes of our people. Anyone having rooms that would be suitable for teachers during the coming winter or anyone who will give board to teachers should let us know as soon as possible. Phone our office No. 100 or our residence Red 439, or call at the office from 3 to 5 any afternoon. We will give all names to the teachers as they arrive and let them make a choice and locate themselves. A number of boys and girls from the country will want to attend our high school during the coming school year and will want to work for their board and room. Anyone who can take such a boy or girl and help them to get an education in this way will be doing a real good. Let us know as soon as convenient.

School will open in all departments on Monday, September 8th. Pupils who expect to enter the sixth grade or under should go direct to the ward school in the district in which they live and the principal will enroll them on Monday, September 8th. Pupils who expect to enter junior or senior high school and did not attend North Platte schools last year should go to the city superintendent's office on the same date. No advanced registration is made.

Chas. J. Killian, of Omaha, has been elected as teacher of chemistry and physics in the senior high school and has accepted. He is a graduate of the University of Nebraska and is a band and orchestra leader. A cadet band will be organized among the school boys and probably an orchestra for both boys and girls.
