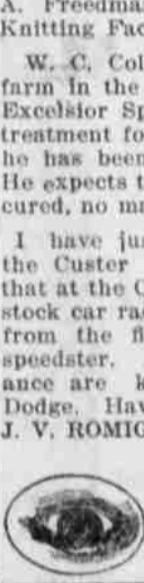

**TRUANCY AND CURFEW DISCUSSED BY WELFARE BOARD**

At a meeting of the board of public welfare held in the public library on Friday evening, among the many other things brought to the attention of the board was the large amount of truancy that was practiced in our public schools last year despite the efforts of the teachers and truant officers of the school.  
It was learned that in many cases that were investigated boys and girls were shielded in their violation of our school laws by the parents rather than giving their help to correct the trouble. The board whose duties run along the line of truant officer is anxious to be of the greatest possible help to bring about a remedy. To this end a committee was appointed from the board to confer with the school authorities in regard to the matter this year. All well-meaning citizens ought to be sufficiently interested to lend their assistance.  
Another thing that was taken under consideration was the almost entire ignoring of the curfew laws of the city and investigation shows that there are a lot of boys and girls that are allowed to run the streets and public places at almost all hours of the night. We have had cases in our criminal court the last few months that prove this practice to be very dangerous, and that, too, is largely due to slackness with which parents look after their children. There were cases in which young girls of fifteen were allowed to be out with young men a great deal older than themselves till two or three o'clock in the morning with the parents exercising no concern whatever. If the parent fails to do their duty by the children what chance on earth has the child got. The destiny of the average child is marked out in the home life, so let the father and mother beware. When the curfew sounds all children around the ages of 12 to 17 ought to be at home in place of on the streets unless they are accompanied by their parents or have a mighty good excuse.  
These cases will receive the attention of the board of public welfare and ought to be supported by every one who is interested in boys and girls.

**Obituary.**  
Sidney Ephraim Timmerman was born in Jefferson county, N. Y., on the 2d day of March, 1847, and departed this life at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Earl Payne, on Sunday morning, August 31, 1919, at the age of 72 years, 5 months and 29 days. Mr. Timmerman had been sick but two days before his death.

When about 18 years of age, he enlisted as a member of Co. S, 9th Ill. cavalry and served for eighteen months of the civil war. He was a member of Old Abe Post No. 63, G. A. R., of Superior, Nebraska.

On May 4th, 1871, he was united in marriage to Sarah Catherine Shuck to which union was born five children, but two of whom are living today. Those who mourn his loss, besides his many friends, are his wife, one son, Albert E. Timmerman and one daughter, Mrs. E. B. Payne, both of this city, and one adopted daughter, Mrs. George Gilbert, of Stella, Neb.

For the past twelve years Mr. Timmerman was a faithful member of the Lutheran church. The funeral service was held at the Episcopal church on Wednesday last, his pastor, Rev. C. Franklin Koch, officiating. Interment was made in the cemetery at Superior, Nebraska.
