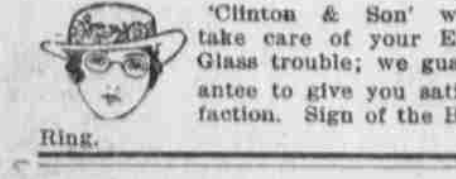

Electrical Undertakings in Japan.

There are 715 electrical undertakings in Japan, including 625 power plants, 42 electric railways, and 48 companies operating both power plants and tramways. This is an increase of 40 companies over last year. The total amount of invested capital in these enterprises is about \$388,000,000, including \$195,000,000 for power plants, \$22,000,000 for railways, and \$173,000,000 for those rendering combined service—an increase of about \$8,000,000 over last year.
