COUNTY NEWS.

Hershey.

(From the Times.)
Art Danielson sold 320 acres in 2-12-23 lying south of Hershey, to Mr. Downs, of North Platte. Consideration was \$11,500.

The many Hershey friends of John O. Paul, station agent at Hershey, about ten years ago will be grieved to learn of his death recently at Powell, Wyo., after a very short illness of typhoid fever. He leaves a wife and five little boys.

Clarence Moore sold the Wyman farm near North Platte the first of the week to Harry Wright and John Kennedy. The farm contains 381 acres and the consideration was \$165 per acre. Mr. Moore bought this place less than a month ago for \$125 per acre, thus clearing up \$11,430 in a very short time.

Blaine Ranner drove in a car of cattle from his place about eleven miles south of Hershey Saturday but was obliged to take them back home because he was unable to secure a car in which to ship them. This stock shipment has been extremely heavy from the west and the local shippers are experiencing real grief in securing any cars at all.

Yorno Brewer reports the sale of the O. W. Edmisten forty, which lies immediately north of Hershey to J. C. Moore and Nell Turple. The consideration was \$350 per acre, the highest price ever paid for land in this territory, if not in the entire valley. The new owners expect to enter this in the corporate limits of Hershey and plot it into town lots.

The annual Odd Fellows' picnic will be held at Max Beer's grove southeast of Hershey on Friday, September 19th. Contrary to the impression of many, this is not given exclusively for the Odd Fellows and their families, but everyone is welcome to come and enjoy themselves. The one and only requirement is that basket dinners be prepared and taken said baskets to contain plenty of fried chicken, baked beans, cake, etc. If you haven't any chickens of your own, get some of the neighbor's, if they don't object.

Ed Hogg, one of our prosperous southside farmers, has been busy the past few weeks threshing the small grain on the south side. He reports very fair yields. Jess Burnett had 50 acres of wheat that averaged better than 24 bushels per acre. Charles Hildebrand's oats went 55 bushels to the acre. Mr. Hogg's own wheat crop did very nicely considering that he had a fifty per cent hail loss. He had 450 acres and it averaged him 11 bushels to the acre. He also has 200 acres of fine corn that he thinks will run close to thirty-five bushels.

Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Winquist and daughter Josephine departed Wednesday morning for Seattle, Washington, where they will visit their daughter. After a six weeks' visit at Seattle they will go to Los Angeles where they will spend the winter.

An honor has come to Mrs. James McCullough of Brady in the winning of a prize trip to Port Huron, Mich. The occasion to be celebrated is the peace jubilee and the demobilizing of the service flag of the Woman's Benefit association in whose interests Mrs. McCullough won the trip. The jubilee lasts three days, beginning Monday, September 15. The village board met in regular session last evening. The board has been petitioned to run the light plant Monday and Tuesday forenoon of each week, and they have set the date of October 1st as the beginning of this service. In order to meet the extra expense from this service and the increase in oils, etc., the board also voted to raise the price of electric current from 45c per kw. to 20c, and the minimum charge will be \$1.00 instead of 75c. All of the above will be effective October 1st.
