COUNTY NEWS.

BRADY.

(From The Vindicator.)

The largest land sale in this vicinity was recorded Wednesday of this week when F. J. Sullivan sold the ranch he recently purchased from H. C. Windup to Arthur Gaudreault of Farmington for \$85,000. Mr. Sullivan's profit in the deal was \$50,000, having paid \$35,000 for the place this spring. Mr. Gaudreault is one of the largest breeders of white face cattle in the state, and has had several sales that have run over the one hundred thousand dollar mark. He has announced that he will spend \$10,000 immediately in improving the place. The ranch consists of 2300 acres of deeded land and 800 acres of school land lease from the state. The ranch is half a mile west of Brady on the Lincoln Highway, and is ideal for the raising of fine stock.

Monday of this week Magnus J. Cohn one of our pioneer settlers, who came to this valley when the Indian raids were a frequent occurrence, Ft. McPherson a military post and Cedarwood Springs the big town of the country, received a check from the government in settlement of a long deferred claim. Fifty years ago a

band of savage Sioux Indians sweeping down into this end of the county drove off with them a herd of horses. Several head of them belonged to Mr. Cohn. The original claim filed with the government was in the neighborhood of nine hundred dollars, the check received this week was for two hundred and forty dollars and was in full settlement of the claim. Mr. Cohn has seen this country develop from a time that you could purchase large tracts of valley land for a string of beads to the present time when very little of the land is for sale for less than two hundred an acre. Cedarwood Springs has passed out of existence and very few people remain who can tell of its location or of the many holdups, Indian raids and other stirring events that happened around it. Mr. Cohn is enjoying good health and lives at present on a tract of land on the south side of the river which he picked out for his homestead those many years ago.

HERSHEY

(From The Timon.)

The poll of votes cast Tuesday at the election was the lightest ever cast at any election in years. Hogland got 23, Beecher 17 and Ebricht 1, in this precinct. If the turn-out was the same in all the precincts in the county there were less than one-fifth of the votes cast.

Geo. Edmiston, who last week sold his farm near Hershey for \$350 per acre, the highest price ever paid for land in the Platte valley, has bought 320 acres near his springs, and will move there about March 1. The land he purchased adjoins that of his son Roy, and the purchase price was \$40 per acre.

A sad accident happened last Thursday afternoon near Sutherland where in the mother of six children lost her life. An old family horse, loose, came up in the front yard of the Orville Ireland home and Mrs. Ireland went out to drive it away from the house when the animal kicked her in the stomach with both hind feet. As she was in a delicate condition the injury was of such a serious nature that she died the next morning. The actions of the horse were entirely unlooked for as the animal had never been known to be mean in any way before and had been in the family for years.

Last Friday evening lightning struck and killed a horse belonging to Ed Cullin, and a close call it was. Mr. Cullin was driving home from Sutherland and as the rain and electric storm came on, he unhitched his team and sought shelter under the spring wagon. After it calmed a little he went to his team about forty feet away and it was here he realized how close the call was, as he found only one animal alive. It occurred about 8 miles out of town.
