SEVENTY-THREE CONTESTANTS ENTERED FOR ROUND-UP

Secretary Hastings, of the Round-up which will be held at the fair grounds October 9th, 10th and 11th, reports that seventy-three entries have been made in the events scheduled for the three days, and among those who have entered are some of the best known riders in the west. The horses and steers for the big show will be furnished by Cogger and Taylor, who for a number of years have furnished animals for the round-up at Ogalalla, frontier days at Cheyenne and for wild west stunts that have in times past been pulled off in this city. They have collected for the exhibitions next week a lot of animals that are as wild as were those that roamed the prairies in the days when wire fences were unknown.

Several of the riders and rope throwers from a distance have already arrived, and among these are Tom Douglas of Pendleton, Ore., who has been one of the premier riders in the big doings which have been held in that city each fall for a number of years past. He is an all-around rider, lariatist and is also a fun-maker. He has entered a number of the events which will be given daily. Other riders who are here waiting for the opening are Mr. and Mrs. Wilkes, of Miles City, Mont., who are returning from the east after a successful tour. They both have a country-wide reputation as riders.

Western Nebraska and Wyoming riders, many of whom are known in North Platte, will put in an appearance next week, and when they all get here and walk the streets with their broad brimmed hats, sheep skin shaps and clanking spurs it will remind one of the time when this city was the center of a "cow country."

NORTH PLATTE LANDING PLACE IN PLANE FLIGHT

President Carroll, of the Chamber of Commerce, is in receipt of a letter from Colonel Joseph C. Morrow, of Chicago, military aviator, department of air service, United States Army which says:

I am informed by the Director of Air Service, United States Army, that he has made arrangements for an airplane reliability test to be made between New York and San Francisco, starting from New York on October 8, 1919. Your city has been considered as being suitably located so that one of the landing fields may be selected within its limits or in the immediate vicinity.

While it is not known at present the exact number of airplanes that will participate in this test there is a sufficient number of entries guaranteed, which, considering the importance of the event, will attract world-wide attention to the event itself and to every locality immediately connected with it; on this account it is assumed that the local officials and influential corporations connected with cities at which landing places will be selected, will desire to favorably identify themselves with the movement and render all assistance possible.

With these ideas, and acting under the instructions of the director of Air Service, Washington, D. C., I shall arrive in your city within a few days for the purpose of trying to locate a suitable field for use as indicated, to secure tentage or shelter for headquarters and for such officers, men and supplies as may be needed for the time being, and to confer with the city authorities regarding the proper police protection of public and private property as well as the safety of contestants and spectators.
