

MEXICAN SHOOTING BROTHER-IN-LAW AT BIRDWOOD

Valentine Gomez, a Mexican employed as a section hand at Birdwood, was brought to the city yesterday morning with two bullet wounds in his back. The shooting was done by Jesus Dementa, a brother-in-law of the man he wounded, also employed on the section, and who following the shooting made a hasty getaway from the section house where the shooting occurred. When Sheriff Salisbury, Deputy Sutton and Dr. F. J. Kerr arrived at the section house at eleven o'clock Sunday night, after having been advised of the shooting, they found Gomez with one wound in the small of the back, the other back of the left shoulder. He refused to tell who did the shooting and why the trouble arose, but from others it was learned that the trouble arose over money matters, that Dementa had got his gun and fired three times, two of the bullets entering Gomez's back, the third cutting a groove along the left side of the head of Sam Jackson, a negro also employed as a section hand. Dr. Kerr gave the wounded Mexican first aid and the following morning the latter was brought to town for further treatment and in order to locate by X-ray one of the bullets which lodged in the body. It is believed that Gomez will recover.

A hunt is being made for the Mexican who did the shooting but up to this morning he had not been apprehended.

AVIATION DETAIL ARRIVES TO AWAIT PLANE FLIGHT

Lieut. Otto G. Funk, and a detail of seven men of the Twelfth Aero Squadron, U. S. A., arrived in town Sunday and will remain until all of the thirty-seven planes which participate in the coast-to-coast durability test pass through North Platte. Lieut. Funk and his detail will have charge of the landing field east of the city, and will be quartered on the field. The men will be served breakfast and supper in town, but the noon lunch will be served on the field by the members of the North Platte A. R. C. Canteen.

The detail of men sent here are experienced airplane ground men, experts in plane machinery and competent to remedy any defect that may exist in the arriving planes.

Twenty-five planes leave New York for San Francisco tomorrow and twelve planes leave San Francisco for New York the same day. As North Platte is practically equidistant from ocean to ocean, the east bound planes are likely to reach this city at about the same time as do the west bound. It is not probable however that all the planes will reach North Platte the same day, they may string along for several days.

When the first plane from the east reaches St. Paul, Neb., its arrival there will be wired Lieut. Funk and will be bulletined in town, so that our people may know when it may be expected to reach this city, and the arrival of east bound planes at Sidney will also be bulletined.
