WHERE BEDS ARE UNKNOWN
Residents of Merida, Yucatan, Enjoy Repose in Hammocks Which May Be Slung Anywhere.

In Merida, Yucatan, the majority of the people do not use beds, in fact very few of them have even seen one. They sleep in hammocks, which are swung across the rooms at night and with no fuss of bedmaking; the person just goes to bed and is gently rocked to sleep by any passing breeze. The climate is so hot that it is only during the months of January and February that a light sheet may be required as covering.

These hammocks are usually made by the mother of the family, writes Lily deG. Osborn, in St. Nicholas, and consist of thread, more or less fine, woven together on great frames with a kind of shuttle or needle. Some of the designs are wonderfully intricate and the colors beautifully blended. I saw one very large one, made in the colors of the United States flag, which was to be sent up to the United States for a gift. It was certainly a work of art, made of the very finest mercerized thread; and yet the hammock could easily support a weight of 300 pounds. A servant always brings his or her own hammock, which is very convenient.

IS LARGEST OF INDUSTRIES

Statisticians Figure in Billions When They Make Computations of Live Stock Business.

The live stock industry is the largest and, in more than one sense, the most important industry in the United States. Its extent, measured by the value of live animals, amounts to more than \$8,000,000,000. Its importance rests in the necessity for live stock to consume the products of farms and ranges, 80 per cent of which, according to census reports, is fed to live stock; in the maintenance of soil fertility, which cannot be kept up continuously and economically without a considerable number of animals as a part of the farm system; in the indispensable place which animal food occupies in the American diet, of which it makes up 38 per cent, based on the average consumer's food-expenditure account; and finally, in the far-reaching influence which the growing, fattening and marketing of live stock has upon the social and economic welfare of all classes of people, including producers, distributors, and the meat-consuming public.

The slaughtering and meat packing business is the largest manufacturing industry in the United States, according to the United States census of manufacturers. The sales of live stock in the Chicago market alone totaled nearly \$1,000,000,000 in 1918, or over \$3,000,000 a day, and the daily sales at all of the centralized live stock markets of this country total close to \$20,000,000.

Petroleum in Mexican Lake.
For hundreds of years Mexican Indians had a horror of what they called the pest spot of Lake Chapala, near the shore at Tizapam. They would not bathe in it or sail around it, declaring that the water was oily. Then, after a time, they cautiously began to paint wooden boats with this oil, which proved so effective in keeping off the water that it became the general custom to use it. They did not know that this was petroleum gushing up through the water—a magnificent flow, about two miles out in the lake, which to this day gushes apparently without varying. When the water is low petroleum floats in solid masses, each large globe weighing about 25 pounds.

MOBILIZED FOR DISASTER CALLS

Red Cross Machinery of Organization Ready for Any Demand for Service.

50 BASE HOSPITALS READY

Chapters Provide Emergency Relief Committees and Establish Supply Centers to Answer Appeals.

Preparedness for disaster relief on a scale never before possible is being undertaken by the American Red Cross as one of the important features of its new peace program, in support of which a nationwide Third Roll Call will be conducted from Nov. 2 to 11 to obtain 20,000,000 members and \$15,000,000.

Plan Survey of Supplies.
Since 1900 disasters of peace have cost many thousands of lives and have brought personal injury or property loss to 1,500,000 persons, destroying property valued at \$1,000,000,000. During 1917 eighty disasters were reported to the American Red Cross, 62 tornadoes, 5 floods, 4 great fires, two earthquakes, two serious mine disasters, two munition plant explosions and the tragic calamity which befell Halifax.

Under the direction of the Red Cross the entire resources of all communities will be mobilized for instant use when needed. Chapters everywhere will create committees to make surveys, locating emergency food supplies, drugs, hospital supplies, cots, mattresses, blankets, clothing, armories, schools and other buildings for housing refugees and will canvass physicians, nurses, social workers and others prepared to respond instantly to calls for their services in disasters.

National Resources Available.
The thirteen divisional organizations will establish disaster relief supply centers and take charge of operations when assistance is needed. In cases of major disasters where the resources of the division in which it occurs are overtaxed, the entire strength of the Red Cross in the country may be mobilized through national headquarters.

Fifty base hospitals organized by the American Red Cross and turned over to the government for use with the military forces will be ready for immediate service.

NURSING CLASSES PLANNED BY RED CROSS CHAPTERS.

Classes in nursing the ill, conducted by trained nurses and open to every woman the local chapters as a part of the peace program outlined by that organization. The course will include instruction in home sanitation, hygiene, care of the sick, and dietetics. These classes are being introduced into public schools and colleges and are offered to employees of department stores and factories, girl scouts, or anyone who desires to learn to prevent illness as far as possible, and to care for the patient when illness comes.

RED CROSS ASKS FOR VOLUNTEERS

Two Hundred and Fifty Thousand Workers Needed to Conduct Third Roll Call.

RECRUITING LISTS OPEN

Every Local Chapter Will Enlist Men and Women to Obtain Annual Memberships From November 2 to 11.

Two hundred and fifty thousand volunteer workers will be needed in the Central Division to conduct the third roll call of the American Red Cross, November 2 to 11.

An appeal is made from Central Division headquarters in Chicago calling upon the men and women of every community to enlist for the ten-day campaign to secure dollar annual memberships. With approximately 600 chapters in the division, this number will allow for about 400 workers to a chapter. Every chapter will have a recruiting office for these workers.

Workers Will Wear Badges.
Each worker will be supplied with a badge proclaiming that the wearer is a volunteer worker for the Red Cross. The success of the campaign will, in reality rest upon the shoulders of these volunteer workers, as the third roll call cannot be a success without a complete organization.

The purpose of the campaign is to obtain, as nearly as possible, a universal enrollment in the Red Cross as an expression of confidence in the past performances of the Red Cross and a reaffirmation of allegiance to the principles which will guide its work in the future. In order to do this every man and woman in the territory of each chapter must be asked to join the Red Cross, and this will require the services of hundreds of workers. The Central Division wants at least 4,000,000 enrollments for 1920. Special stress during the campaign will be placed upon the annual one-dollar memberships in order to make the roll call an appeal to all the people.

Past Campaigns Successful.
Success has attended all Red Cross activities in the Central Division in the past. In the last war fund drive this division, with a quota of \$13,800,000, subscribed \$21,307,662.83. In the second roll call, more than 4,000,000 were enrolled.

The money quota for the Central Division is \$3,000,000. Throughout the action, the Red Cross will enlist 20,000,000 members and raise \$15,000,000 to carry on its international, national and local work.
