GOVERNMENT REFUSES TO LIFT THE INJUNCTION

Organized labor's proposal for ending the coal strike through withdrawal of injunction proceedings against officers of the United Mine Workers of America was rejected bluntly Wednesday by the department of justice.

The government's answer to the union suggestion advanced by Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, was given by Assistant Attorney General Ames, who declared the strike was a violation of law and that the only place to fight it out was in court.

Labor leaders, visibly disturbed by this refusal, agreed with the operators that the statement of the government's position swept away all hope of immediate settlement of the strike, involving more than 400,000 soft coal miners in 28 states.

Agitators to be Prosecuted.

The government dragnet for all agitators and "Reds" is being laid. The department of justice has sent many agents into the coal fields and among other industries and is planning a general round-up of all those who are resorting to agitation to keep the miners and other workers aroused.

Evidence against agitators that has been gathered by the department of justice is being carefully safeguarded. It is known, however, that the matter of agitators was discussed by Dr. Garfield in his conference with J. D. A. Morrow, representative of the operators, and that the belief expressed that the chief point in the difficulty of getting the men back at work would be eliminated if the "local Reds" and "revolutionists" in the mining localities could be curbed.

Nebraska Towns Out of Coal.

Insistent calls for coal from a large number of Nebraska towns are being received by the state railway commission at Lincoln. The town of Arnold, northeast of this city, wired that it had been out of coal for two weeks and people were suffering. Acting Governor Barrows warns the people to conserve fuel wherever possible and says: "Wherever there is a shortage of coal, it would be well to take the matter up with the local agent of the railroad in the town where the shortage exists. He will be expected to take the matter up with the proper railroad authorities higher up."

Ohio Wets are Beaten

Ohio has rolled up another dry majority. The size of the majority is yet in doubt but returns from half of Ohio's eighty-eight counties received at the office of the secretary of state indicate that it will not be less than 40,000 and probably 50,000.

Non-Partisan Leaguers Lose.

Returns from Tuesday's election for 109 delegates to the state constitutional convention received indicate that the non-partisan league will not have more than twelve representatives.
