NEBRASKA TELEPHONE COMPANY WILL PUT UP BUILDING

In Friday's issue a four-line local announced the sale of the Mrs. Sarah Bangs property in the 200 block on west Fifth street to T. F. Healey. At the time the item was written it was known that the purchase had been made by Mr. Healey for the Nebraska Telephone Company, but at that particular time the matter was not "ripe" for publication. The telephone company purchases the lot for the purpose of building a "home" for its local plant, and before the end of 1920 it is hoped to have a building completed that will have cost the company not less than \$40,000.

It was known for some time that the company desired a building site, and an offer of \$9,000 was made for the Redfield corner at Fifth and Vine, but the Doctor asked \$12,500. Mrs. Carlson was approached, but she declined to set a price, and Charley Hendy, who owns the former Longley property, was also asked to name a price. The site purchased, however, is just as satisfactory to the company as either of the properties named. The building to be erected by the company will cover the entire lot, will be two stories, with brick as the construction material. It will be built with a view of permanency, and therefore well constructed.

The cost of this building will be less than one-half the sum the company will invest in the North Platte plant, for an entire new system of switchboards and appurtenances will be installed in the new building. The total expenditure as proposed will reach about one hundred thousand dollars. It is the policy of the Nebraska Telephone Co. to own its own "home" in all the larger cities, and that it has decided to make this investment in North Platte is evidence of the belief of the officials in the future growth of the city.

SWIMMING POOL ASSURED AT THE CITY PARK

At a meeting of the Welfare Association last evening a committee which had been appointed jointly by the Welfare Board and the Park Commissioners made a report on the feasibility of constructing a swimming pool at the north side city park. The meeting unanimously recommended that the Park Commissioners accept the report and begin at once such construction work as is possible. A committee consisting of D. M. Leopold, J. C. Wilson and F. R. Elliott was appointed to act in conjunction with the Park Board in this work. The pool will be located at the north side of the city park grove, will be about 100x300 feet in area and the water supply will be taken from the North Platte irrigation ditch at a point several hundred yards west of the cemetery and carried to the park through a lateral. The estimated cost of the lateral and pool is between four and five thousand dollars.
