Complaints About Fuel.

Complaints are frequent these days concerning inability to get results from the fuel administration. Requests for fuel from consumers vitally in need of coal, and whose failure to get coal may affect the lives, health and property of a large number of people, are sent to district headquarters daily and the one thing that these requests inevitably bring is slow action.

A large number of small Nebraska towns are out of coal or nearly out. Their requests have been received, forwarded to headquarters and the railroad agents in charge of the coal are awaiting orders to supply them.

The one thing that is getting on the nerves of men who must hear these complaints is the slow action on requests. Some coal requests are being approved and some coal is being delivered where needed, but in a number of instances the margin of safety has been reduced to the breaking strain.—Lincoln Journal.
