

Coal Conservation Necessary.
 Unless there is a change in the coal conditions within the next week—and the prospects for such are not very bright—delivery of coal to North Platte non-essential institutions and business houses may be prohibited by the federal board. The situation here in North Platte is growing more tense, that is, surplus stocks in homes are being reduced to a point nearing the danger line, and as each household exhausts his supply the general demand must become greater, and this demand is already heavier than the supply received by the dealers—in other words we are gradually facing a coal famine which cannot result in anything but suffering. Conservation of coal to the fullest extent is necessary in North Platte, a fact that must be patent to all.
