Mr. and Mrs. Jack Wheeler meanwhile have arrived with the notion that they have been invited to dinner on that night. They are discovered to be as sadly ill-assorted as the Bartletts, except that it is Mrs. Wheeler who is overly domestic and Jack who pines for a spree. A deft scene or two, and presto. Mr. Bartlett and Mrs. Wheeler are left alone, facing the fact that they are not only deserted, but have been deceived. They vow a revenge. Although they have no fondness for each other they agree to sit up together till the recreant spouses return, who, finding them thus compromised, will be abashed by their own wickedness and will reform.

As the clock winds over toward the wee small hours, the two innocents can hardly keep awake, and having heard that drinks were great for keeping parties going, they begin to mix and drink all the fearsome brews that ignorance and cellaret can provide.

What happens by the time the wanderers return makes a marvelous scene. What happens when, instead of being penitent and abashed, they are outraged and threaten the extreme penalty of the law, makes another quite as good. The explanations which don't explain and the circumstantial evidence which tightens with every coil, very nearly wrecks the two households. And even at the very happy end, Mr. Hopwood tips it so that a husband who is really better than he should be, is virtually impossible to reform.

J. A. Foster Laid to Rest.
The funeral of J. A. Foster, who died in Omaha Sunday, was held at the Episcopal church Tuesday afternoon Rev. Mackintosh officiating.

The deceased was born in Bengal East Indies, April 6, 1837, came to the United States in 1858 and to North Platte in December, 1869. He served in the Crimean war from 1855 to 1858, and in the civil war from April 29, 1863, to its close. Following his discharge he enlisted in the regular army and participated in Indian campaigns in the west. He remained with the regulars until the early part of 1869, when he was honorably discharged.
