NEBRASKA'S CROP PRODUCTION FOR THE YEAR 1919

Figures compiled in the office of Secretary Stuhr of the state department of agriculture show that Nebraska during the crop year of 1919 fell below 1918 in potatoes, spring wheat and barley. There was a big shortage in potatoes. Last year 121,432 acres were planted, which yielded an average of 86.4 bushels to the acre and a total crop of 10,497,998 bushels. This year the acreage was 103,977, the yield per acre 55.1 and the total production 5,737,312, or about four bushels to each inhabitant.

For 1918 the oats acreage was 2,580,877, the average production 22.2 bushels and the total 56,215,487. In 1919 the acreage was much less, 2,133,475, but the average per acre rose to 32.8 and the total to 70,133,935.

For 1918 the winter wheat acreage was 3,915,844, the average production 11.1 per acre and the total 33,520,047. In 1919 the acreage was increased to 3,716,159, the average per acre rose to 14.8 and the total to 55,280,969.

For 1918 the spring wheat acreage was 811,815, the average production 11.9, and the total 9,721,793. In 1919 the acreage fell to 667,572, the average to 8.5 and the total to 5,699,658.

For 1918 the corn acreage was 6,954,961, the average 17.7 and the total 123,298,649. In 1919 the acreage increased to 7,029,811, the average to 26.2, and the total to 184,361,094.

For 1918 the rye acreage was 387,596, the average 12.9 and the production 5,037,870. In 1919 the acreage rose to 408,160, the average to 16, and the production to 6,556,629.

For 1918 the barley acreage was 242,659, the average 16.5, and the production 4,003,381. In 1919 the acreage decreased to 217,174, but the average rose to 27.7 and the total production fell short but a trifle, being 5,984,944.

For 1918 the alfalfa acreage was 1,164,941, the average 2.1 and the total 2,446,376. In 1919 the acreage was 1,180,234, the average rose to 2.7 tons and the total production 3,214,999.

For 1918 the wild hay acreage was 2,587,678, the average .88 of a ton and the total 2,285,010. In 1919 the acreage rose to 2,771,234, the average 1.02 and the total 2,842,384 tons.
