MAYOR STREITZ ISSUES NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC

Under instructions received by me December 6th, from Mr. John A. Bennewitz, regional fuel director, the city fuel commission are limited in the issuing of fuel orders to the first five classes of the priority list issued after the armistice, and to those under certain restrictions, some of which follow:

All retail stores, including groceries, and meat markets.

All manufacturers, wholesalers, brokers and commission merchants.

All laundries, all office buildings and offices, all barber shops, automobile shops, offices and salerooms, to be open only from 10 a. m. to 5 p. m.

All drug stores open from 10 a. m. to 5 p. m. for regular business. Prescription clerks may be on duty as may be necessary to fill prescriptions but must not sell any merchandise but drugs.

Public service garages must not sell gasoline, oils or other merchandise before 10 a. m. or after 5 p. m. Temperature shall not exceed 40 degrees F.

All churches must close except for a three hour period on Sunday morning. All midweek services must be dispensed with.

All public schools, colleges and other institutions of education shall close except that proper provision may be made for housing boarding students and faculty.

All theatres, moving picture shows, dance halls, pool halls, bowling alleys and all other places of amusements shall be closed including lodge rooms.

Hotels, restaurants and rooming houses must confine their sales between the hours of 5 p. m. and 10 a. m. to sleeping accommodations and meals and refrain from merchandise sales during these hours.

All window displays and other unnecessary lighting must not be turned on.

By following these instructions and doing all in our power to conserve both light and fuel, the fuel director assures us that all will be done that can be done to keep diverted to us enough coal to keep this community from suffering.

Let us all work in harmony, laying aside selfish interests and hope that conditions for all will soon improve.
