PAST AND FUTURE WORK OF THE HOME BUILDERS

The first annual stockholders meeting and election of officers of the North Platte Home Builders, Incorporated, was held Monday.

This organization was started about July 1st, 1919, and has engaged generally in the contracting and building business, specializing in dwellings. The report of the president showed a very satisfactory business for the six months since the organization, with the completion of six dwellings and seven others under construction. It was found from this report that the business had increased to such an extent that it has become necessary to install several labor saving devices and machines and upon recommendation of the president, some \$1500.00 worth of machinery was ordered installed in the work shop which has been equipped on Vine street; and in addition to the electric lathe and other machinery already installed, an expensive wood working machine has been ordered placed in the shop and in order to facilitate business, a modern cement mixer and a truck for the transportation of material was ordered purchased.

Expansion of the business has become so great that more work has been offered than present facilities would accommodate. The present building plan for the year 1920 covers a schedule of between twenty-five and thirty dwelling houses in addition to those now under construction and it will undoubtedly be necessary to increase the crew of over twenty men now steadily employed.

The stockholders present proceeded to the election of a board of directors for the ensuing year, with the result that the following members were elected: J. G. Beeler, F. C. Pielsticker, J. C. Hollman, J. E. Sebastian and C. F. Temple.

Following the adjournment of the stockholders' meeting the board of directors convened for the purpose of organization and chose the following officers: C. F. Temple, president; J. E. Sebastian, vice president; M. Lillian Sturges, secretary, and L. E. Mehlmann, treasurer.

The North Platte Home Builders have filled a long felt necessity for an organization to push the home building campaign in North Platte and in the coming year it intends to exert its strongest efforts not only for the personal erection of dwelling houses but for the encouraging of the "Own Your Own Home" campaign put on by the United States government, and to this end it is hoped that the citizens of North Platte will cheerfully co-operate.

Steel Strike Is Still On.

Fully one-third of the estimated 350,000 steel workers, who obeyed the order of the national steel strike committee, September 22 last, are still on say the strike leaders. Yet the employers assert that the mills and furnaces of the Carnegie Steel Company the principal interest against which the strike was directed as well as the mills and furnaces of independent companies, are in steady operation, with virtually a normal force of workmen. In recent weeks, strike headquarters in Pittsburg has devoted its time to keeping in line the men who had gone back to work, and to caring for the destitute, while the steel companies have been busy building up their forces and increasing production. "We have dug in and are biding our time," say the union leaders when asked concerning their plans for the future.
