The Income Tax.

In making out his income-tax return the taxpayer is required to show both gross and net income. Gross income includes practically every dollar the taxpayer received during the year 1919. In arriving at net income, upon which the tax is assessed he is allowed the tax deduction, which will be explained later, plus the amount of his exemption.

Incomes below \$5,000 are exempt from surtax. The single man with no dependents and an income for 1919 of

\$2,000 will pay a tax of \$40 instead of \$60 as for 1918, and a married man with an income of \$2,500, and no dependents except his wife will pay \$20 instead of \$30.

Husband and wife whose combined net income for 1919 equalled or exceeded \$2,000 must file a return, either separate or joint as desired. A widow, a woman living apart from her husband, or a maid must file a return if her net income equalled or exceeded \$1,000. A minor whose income for 1919 was \$1,000 or more must make a

return. If the minor's income was less than \$1,000, it must be included in the return of the parent.

Gunner Depew a Mex Victim.

By United Press.—Albert N. DePew noted war hero and author of a book which bears his name, is dead at Tucson, Ariz., the victim of Mexican bandits, according to a telegram received from Joseph Burnet, secretary of the Tucson Y. M. C. A. The report states that Depew was attacked by the bandits after leaving the city alone, on a prospecting tour.

That said bids will be opened at the office of said Secretary at 7:30 o'clock P. Preparing for Private Control.

The corporate managers of the railroads are proceeding to reorganize their forces so that operation of their properties when the president returns them to private control may be reassured with a minimum of friction and lost motion. Many new presidents have been elected and many old presidents and other officers who entered government service during the war have been reappointed and reelected to their pre-war posts. That there will be many similar preparations is generally expected. There is also a general feeling that when the roads are turned back they will go into the hands from which they were lifted by the president at the close of 1917.
