MEXICAN WANTED MAY BE ONE HELD AT DENVER

Sheriff Salisbury received a wire last night from C. L. Patterson, head of the Union Pacific secret service at Denver, stating that a Mexican is being held in that city who corresponds to the description of the one wanted for the murder of Officers McComber and Rogers. The sheriff is asked to send some one to Denver to identify the man. This morning Sheriff Salisbury called up the secret service office in Denver for the purpose of giving additional description of the man wanted. The man held in Denver gives his name as Banda, but this is probably an alias, as the man wanted is known to have gone under a half dozen different names.

Sheriff Salisbury had not succeeded in getting the Denver office up to the time The Tribune went to press. The only persons who could positively identify the man wanted are Mexicans, and the sheriff has some doubt as to whether he could with safety send them to Denver to identify the man held.

Will Appoint Chief of Police

It is expected that at a meeting of the city council this evening Mayor Streitz will appoint a chief of police and an officer to fill the existing vacancies. For chief there are said to be a number of applicants.
