NATIONAL PROHIBITION IS NOW IN EFFECT

The eighteenth amendment, which prohibits the manufacture, sale or ransportation of intoxicating liquors ecame effective at 12:01 a. m. Saturday night. What you can do, and what you cannot legally do in regard to the use of liquor is summed up as

What You Can Do You can keep liquor in a governnent bonded warehouse.

You can keep Houor in your home: you can even drink it there and serve it to bonefide guests.

If you are sick you can get a doctor's prescription and have it filled at the drug store. The limit on this is one pint every ten days. If you move you can take your

liquor with you, providing you get a permit first from the state prohibition director

What You Can Not Do. You can not buy a drink anywhere

In the United States. Legally you can not carry a flask

on the hip. You can not drink anywhere except at home or as a bonafide guest in the home of a hospitable friend.

You can not move your liquor stock from a storage warehouse or a safety leposit vault to your home. You can not have liquor in your clul or your hotel, unless you have a legal

residence there, and then you must keep it in your own rooms or in a loseker over which you have "complete and exclusive control.

You can not have two legal residences in the same town, You can not buy fruit juice after it starts to ferment.

You can not carry or ship liquor out I the country You can not carry or ship it in.

der placard. In order to check the spread of these and other contagions, the following information-applying especially to January families in which there are school children-is published.

The major part of these regulations are absolute rules of the State Board of Health, which the Local Board of Health cannot change. Such addition may be made by the Local Board of Health to meet such conditions as may arise in the interests of the general ealth of the city.

All children of a family in which here are any of the following diseases shall be excluded from the public schoo

Small-pox, Diphtheria, Meningitis Infantile Paralysis, Influenza, Scarlet Fever, Measles, Septic Sore Throat, Rubeila, Mumps, Whooping Cough, Typhoid Fever. Chicken-pox, Pedicalosis (lice), Scables (itch).

A child who has the disease cannot return to school until at least the number of days prescribed by law has With scarlet fever this is 21 days, small-pox 21 days, and measles days, from the appearance of the

The apparently well children in a family in which there is a contagious disease are also excluded and cannot re-enter school for a period of two or three weeks. The exact time varles with the particular disease. This is not because they "carry" the disease from the sick so much as because they may really have the disease in an early stage when it does not show itself and yet they are able to infect others with whom they come in con tact. These diseases are just as contagious before the rash as during it. It has been held by the courts that the general characteristics of the com mon contagious diseases is a matter of common knowledge and that failure to report the same is equivalent to intentional concealment. If the head of the household does not wish to call physician, then he or she assumes the responsibility of the diagnosis If you have a sick child keep all o the children out of school until you are sure that it is not a contagious

Children out of school on account o sickness may re-enter only on a signed statement from their family physician stating that they are free from contagious disease. The school authorities, board of health and police department are co-operating in this work and all families are requested to do the same. BOARD OF HEALTH.


