NORTH PLATTE THIRTY-FIVE YEARS AGO

(At the request of many, in this issue we start republishing events which transpired in North Platte thirty-five years ago. In times past a review of these events has been made, but at that time many of our citizens were not then residents and to them the review may prove interesting.—Editor.)

(From The Tribune, Jan. 24, 1885.)

There was five or six inches of snow on the ground and cold weather made sleighing. Among those who had sleighs on the streets were Isaac Dillon, W. E. Beach, B. I. Hlman, Sheriff Bangs and Al Mitchell.

Col. P. J. O'Rourke died at his residence on the Ft. McPherson reservation at the age of seventy-two. He had held the position of custodian of the national cemetery for several years.

Judge Hoagland delivered a lecture at the Methodist church, taking as his subject "The Mississippi of Intemperance."

The postoffices of Garfield and Jackson, in the northeast part of the county were established. The former postoffice is still on the map.

Prof. Klein fell on his way home at night and was so badly injured that he had been confined to the house for some time.

An engine on the Denver branch run reached this terminal with pilot turn off and headlight smashed. The engine had run into a bunch of cattle and killed eighty-three.

Frank Frederic killed two lynx while hunting on the Birdwood. In those days these animals were plentiful on Birdwood creek.

The Wild West was showing in New Orleans. Con Groner and Johnnie Baker were two of the stars.

Louis Thoecke was exhibiting samples of rye which he had grown in 1884 on land south of the river. The Tribune predicted that rye would do well in Lincoln county.

The county treasurer's semi-annual statement showed balances of \$18,884.99.

Dr. Dillard had returned from a trip to New York City and Washington.

Lots in Peniston's addition were offered for sale at \$200 each.

The young mechanics held a masquerade dance at the Keith opera house. Over one hundred maskers appeared on the floor, among whom were Mike Sorenson, Del Huntington, C. S. Clinton and Joe Quinn.

Rebekah Lodge No. 10 met twice a month. Mrs. H. H. Blakesly was noble grand.

The city council had a lively fight over the proposition of giving J. H. McConnell an exclusive franchise for an electric light system.

The congregation at the Methodist church had been smoked out the previous Sunday owing to a faulty flue.

The Catholic ladies gave a neck tie social and netted \$125.

DEBT TO U. S. TOO BIG TO EVER MEET

Owing the United States \$18,000,000,000, Europe is bankrupt and probably never will pay its debts, in the opinion of Mark O. Prentiss, chairman of the board of directors of the bankers' foreign credit clearing house. Mr. Prentiss, who is in Washington participating in conferences on the foreign exchange situation, said that he looks for the repudiation by the allies of their enormous financial obligations, "as the only way out."

"The world is sitting on a volcano that may start its eruption at any time with the result that the financial structure of the world, as we have grown accustomed to it will be totally destroyed," said Mr. Prentiss. It also became known that the house committee on ways and means, after thoroughly canvassing the question of the payment of interest on the \$10,000,000,000 loaned to the allies by the United States, has given tacit approval of Secretary of the Treasury Glass' negotiations for the funding of these demand loans into long term obligations.

The committee became convinced that the allies could not pay the interest of \$500,000,000 a year and concluded that the funding process, combining interest with principal is "the only way out." Mr. Prentiss said that foreign exchanges are likely to continue their decline until they reach the vanishing point, the money of many foreign countries becoming absolutely without value in international exchange, possibly within the next few weeks.
