LOCAL CAMPAIGN ON H. C. L. STARTS FEBRUARY FIRST

The official campaign in Nebraska to reduce the high cost of living will be formally inaugurated in every county in the state February first. Mrs. Charles G. Ryan, state director and inasmuch as shortage of supply shall be the basis of this campaign, we adopt the slogan, "Work and Save." The plan embodies mass meetings in every community in which public speakers will appeal for the co-operation of all classes of citizens in the practice of thrift and in the elimination of luxuries. This organized effort against high prices has its inception with the Department of Justice at Washington, and in response to its appeal, the General Federation of Women's Clubs, and the Nebraska Federation of Women's Clubs, adopted the following resolution: "That we offer our assistance to our government in promoting the campaign to make America a thrifty nation."

Every fortune founded on thrift was based on the unvarying practice of saving a definite sum, small or large, before any spending was done. The first dollar out of the pay envelope or salary check is always the easiest dollar to spend. It is also the easiest dollar to save and the woman or man who can't save that dollar can't save any dollar.

Governor McKelvie appeals to all women of Nebraska that we practice thrift in our homes and extend it to the homes of others. That we will teach it to our children. That we will interest our friends in it. A multitude of thrifty homes will make a thrifty nation. Many times during the war you thought that you were doing all that you could, but when a new call for service came, you responded as you will to this emergency.

Let us co-operate as enthusiastically and efficiently as in every other campaign. No matter how strenuous the effort required, or how great the sacrifice involved, Nebraska women have never failed to respond to the call for service. They will do so now.

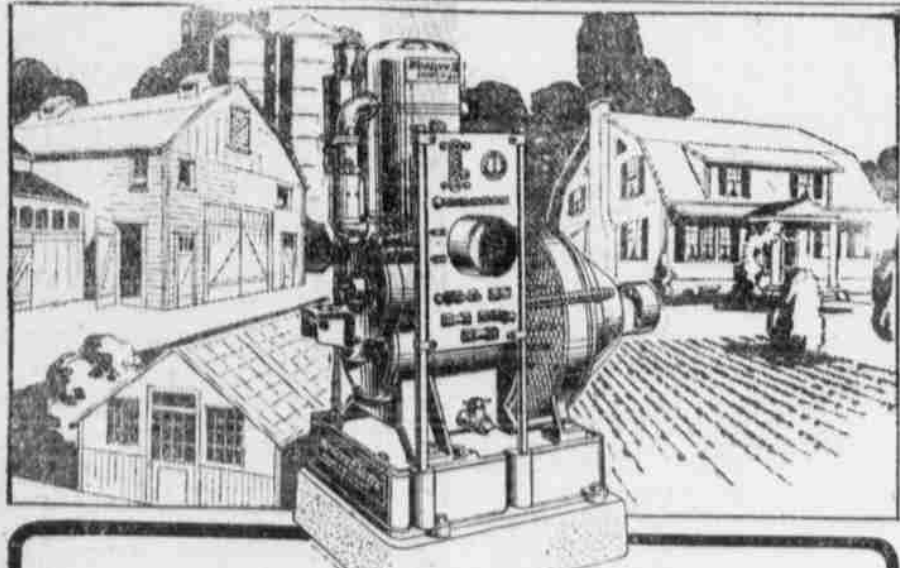
