WAR ON HIGH COST OF LIVING NOW ON

ORDINANCE NO. 111.

An Ordinance Defining, Prescribing and Defining the City Limits of the City of North Platte, Lincoln County, Nebraska, and Repealing Ordinance No. 8, as Passed by the City Council of the City of North Platte, Lincoln County, Nebraska, on the 1st Day of August, 1911.
Be it ordained by the mayor and city council, of the City of North Platte, Lincoln County, State of Nebraska:
SECTION 1. That the City Limits of the City of North Platte, Lincoln County, Nebraska, shall be as follows:
Commencing at the Northeast corner of Section four (4), in township thirteen (13) North, of range thirty (30), west of the 6th p. m., in Lincoln County, Nebraska, running thence south on the west line of said section to the southwest corner of Block seven (7) of Residence Park Sub-division as the same is platted and recorded in the office of the county clerk of Lincoln County, Nebraska; thence East along the south line of Residence Park Sub-division to the southeast corner of block twenty (20) of said Residence Park Sub-division; thence south along the west line of south Willow street to the north line of Phillip avenue, as shown on the recorded plat of Graceland addition, in the office of the county clerk of Lincoln County, Nebraska; thence east along the north line of said Phillip avenue to the place of intersection of the north line of said Phillip avenue with the west line of south Locust street; thence north along the west line of south Locust street to the place where the said west line of said south Locust street intersects the north line of the Suburban Irrigation District, right-of-way; thence east along the north line of said Suburban Irrigation District right-of-way to the southeast corner of block sixteen (16) in Taylor's addition to the City of North Platte, Nebraska, as the same is platted and recorded in the office of the county clerk of Lincoln County, Nebraska; thence south along the east line of Taylor's addition, and Peniston's addition to the City of North Platte, Nebraska, to the place on said line extended intersects the north line of section four (4), in township thirteen (13) north, of range thirty (30), west of the 6th p. m.; thence along the north line of said section four (4), in township thirteen (13) north, of range thirty (30), west of the 6th p. m. to the point where said north line of said section four (4) intersects the south line of east Second street as shown by the recorded plat thereof; thence east along the south line of said Second street to the point where the south line of said Second street intersects the east line of Bryan avenue; thence north along the east line of Bryan avenue to a point where the east line of Bryan avenue if extended, intersects the southeast corner of plat of land owned by the Union Stock Yards; thence west along the south line of said section four (4) to the south line of said tract of land owned by said Union Stock Yards to the place where said line intersects the east line of section thirty-three (33), in township fourteen (14) north, of range thirty (30); thence north along the east line of said section thirty-three (33) to the point where said east line of said section thirty-three (33) intersects the north line of east 8th street in the City of North Platte, Lincoln County, Nebraska; thence west along the north line of said 8th street to a point where the north line of said 8th street intersects the east line of north Cottonwood street in said City of North Platte, Nebraska; thence north along the east line of said north Cottonwood street to a point where the east line of said Cottonwood street would meet the north line of east 12th street extended; thence west along the north line of said east 12th street extended to the southeast corner of lot fifteen (15) in Isaac Dillon's Sub-division; thence north along the east line of said lot fifteen (15) of said Isaac Dillon's sub-division to the north line of said section thirty-three (33), in township fourteen (14) north, of range thirty (30); thence east along the north line of said section to the northeast corner of said section; thence north along the east line of section twenty-eight (28) in township fourteen (14) north, of Range thirty (30), west of the 6th p. m. to the point where said east line intersects the south bank of the North Platte River; thence west on the south bank of said North Platte River to the place where the east line of the County Road which crosses the said North Platte River in said section twenty-eight (28) intersects the south line of the North Platte River; thence south along the east line of said county road to a point where said east line of said County Road intersects the north line of section thirty-three (33) in township fourteen (14) north, of range thirty (30); thence west along the north line of said section thirty (30)
